The trouble arose when the church authorities removed the priest and sent in his place the Rev. John Guiez. During the new bishop's first service he was told that he was not wanted and the latter was violently ejected from the church by the angry parishioners. The bishop refused to heed the request for Father Guiez's removal and ordered the church closed. An appeal was sent to Mgr.
