THE GOVERNOR INTERFERES.

Kansas Executive's Note of Warning to Weir City Strikers.

TOPERA, July 25,-Governor Lewelling has received a number of telegrams from Weir City, but declines to make public their contents or the names of the persons who sent them. They were, however, regarded as of sufficient importance to be the subject of a secret meeting of the state officers and other advisors of the governor in his private office. Senator Martin was present during this meeting, but whether he was especially summoned or simply happened to be present is not known.

After the meeting had lasted some time Private Secretary Close came out with the following telegram to the sheriff at Weir City, which the governor said was all he had to give to the press:

TOPEKA, Kan., July 24. C. D. Arnold, Sheriff, Weir City:

Under no circumstances can the state authorities permit violence. Strikers must not trespass, nor assault United States deputy marshals, nor destroy property. Read this to the miners. L. D. LEWELLING, Governor.

Every effort was made to conceal their destination by the railroad people and also by the men themselves, but the families of five of the men were seen by a reporter and each stated that they had gone to Weir City. Many of these are desperate characters and if they are attacked they will undoubtedly fight. Wrecked by a Runaway Engine.
