Counselor Waters' Report on the County's view. The correspondent of the Chi-

Expert. A Kansas City local paper says: "It is probable that the county court will appoint some young lawyer as expert accountant. County Counselor Waters in a written opinion, submitted to the court today, held that the county clerk is the accountant of the county, and is required by law to keep an account with each county official. There is no law authorizing the appointment of an expert accountant, but Colonel Waters said that there should be some one to investigate the reports of county officials. He held that the court might appoint an assistant county counselor and assign him to those duties.

O. H. Gentry, who was appointed superintendent of the poor farm by the new county court last week, came before the court today and reported that there was not a change of clothing in the institution for the inmates. Judge Stone was surprised to hear this and the court instructed Superintendent Gentry to buy what clothing was needed at once. Superintendent Gentry was also instructed to make a complete invoice of everything on the farm.
