
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

It is Fraternal and Benevolent-assisting and protecting members while living and their widows and orphans when they are renoved by death.

It upholds the right of private judgmentthe untrammelled freedom of opinion; believes the public schools are an essential safeguard of the state, and should be kept free from ecclesiastical or sectarian control and that persons disloyal to the government -who hold a mental allegiance to the pope of Rome-should be rigorously excluded from teaching therein.

It believes primary allegiance is due to the government which protects the lives. liberties and properties of its citizens, and that ecclesiastical authority should act under any circumstances, be permitted to meddle in the affairs of state, and that coercion of a citizen in the exercise of his or her right of franchise, under the guise of religlogs or spiritual authority should be puntaked as a crime against the state.

That it is the duty of every citizen to defend the inwfully constituted authority and institutions of our country against corrupt and inimical influences, as well as against armed assailants, to the end that our glorious freedom be protected and transmitted unimpaired to posterity.

It encourages habits of frugality and in It encourages habits of frugality and in dustry among its members, and is proud to hoast that Orangemen seldom become a public charge or accept pauper bread.

It believes in the restriction of immigration and the extension of time for the naturalization of citizens, and that the public and shall be held for actual American citizens who become settlers.

The Loyal Orange lustitution of the United States of America has certain requirements for membership:

That a man shall be an actual American citizen, having compiled with the laws of the United States with regard to naturalization, and without a mental reservation.

That the applicant shall be a Protestant, and also that his parents and wife shall be Protestants.

That he shall be thrifty and successful in his business; honorable and truthful in his dealings with his fellowman, and shall be known as a law-abiding citizen.

That he will endeavor to give his children or any children under his charge at least a good common school education, being careful to avoid all popish doctrines and

That he shall be in sound health at the time of making application.

It makes no difference where a man was born, so long as he meets the foregoin requirements.

day of July, 1845. Its first inception was for the protection of Mechanics and Workingmen alone, and for a number of years none out operative mechanics and workingmen were admitted to its membership; but the great interests of principles involved in its existence, caused a departure from that plan, and the Order has for years existed and exists today as an order of speculative me chanics, recognizing every one possessed of the birth requirements, who works for a maintainance either by hand or brais or both as eligible to membership, and numbers among its members men of every profession and calling in life.

The objects of this order are to assist each other in obtaining employment: to encourage each other in business; to establish a sick and funeral fund; to establish a fund for the relief of widows and orphans and to aid members; and to aid members who, through Providence, may be incapacitated from tol lowing their usual vocations, in obtaining situations suitable to their afflictions. We believe that the Bible should be read in our public schools; not to teach sectarianism, but to incurrent list teachings. It is the recognized standard of all moral and civil law; we therefore believe, that our children should be educated in its teachings, but that no dogma or creed should be taught at the same time.
