

FOR JUDGES OF DISTRICT COURT.

The Strongest and Best Judicial Ticket Ever Nominated in Nebraska.

Irrespective of party, those competent to form intelligent opinions on the subject concede the fact that the Republicans of this district have this year nominated the strongest, ablest and by all means the best set of candidates for judges of the district court that were ever presented to the voters of the district, or of the State of Nebraska.

Clinton N. Powell was born in Cenesus, Livingston county, N. Y., in 1833 and spent the early years of his life on a farm. Relying upon his own efforts, and doing farm work during vacations, after leaving the district school where he obtained the rudiments of an education, he worked his way through the Genesee State Normal School, and soon afterward entered upon the study of law in the office of Cogswell, Bently & Cogswell, of Rochester, N. Y.

Mr. Powell is a careful, reliable and industrious lawyer, possessing studious habits and large mental and physical capacity for labor. His logical, analytical mind, united with his power of clear and scholarly statement, very strongly qualify and recommend him to the people for judicial work.

Willard W. Slabaugh is a native of Ohio, and was born Feb. 29, 1856. As a poor boy he worked out by the month during the summer seasons, attended school winters, and by hard study fitted himself for college, through which he worked his way by teaching college classes. He is a graduate of Hiram college of which the lamented President James A. Garfield was once president.

Mr. Slabaugh came to Sarpy county in 1884, with just four dollars in his pocket, and during the winters of '84 and '85 was engaged in teaching school. In the latter year he began the practice of law in Papillion, afterward moving to Omaha, where he successfully continued the practice of his profession. He is now assistant county attorney of Douglas county, a position to which he was appointed in 1893, and in which he has served under two administrations. By his thorough knowledge of the law and his judicial temperament he is peculiarly fitted for the position for which he has been placed in nomination.

Benjamin S. Baker was born in Jackson county, Iowa, forty-five years ago. He, too, as a poor boy, had to make his own way in the world, and worked on a farm to pay his way through Iowa University, from which he graduated in 1871, and from the law department of the same institution in 1874. He came to Nebraska and located at Fairbury in 1878. In 1888 he was elected to the state legislature; and in 1890 was appointed to the position of United States Attorney for the district of Nebraska, and moved to Omaha. So ably did he fill the responsible position that, on the expiration of his four years' term, he was continued in office for three months, and then retired with the highest and most flattering commendations of a Democratic administration. He is well equipped mentally and by his experience for a position on the district bench.

Judge William W. Keyser was born near Plattsburg, N. Y., June 9, 1852. When he was four years old his parents removed to La Crosse, Wis., and afterward in 1858 removed to Mankato, Minn., where he was residing at the time of the Indian massacre in 1862, of which he still has vivid recollections. In 1879 he graduated as bachelor of literature at the University of Minnesota. In 1883 he graduated from the St. Louis law school, and took a \$50 prize for the best legal thesis, which was published in the law journals of that year and received favorable comment. In 1883 the subject of this sketch came to Omaha and entered upon the practice of law;

and in January, 1891, took his seat as one of the judges of the district court, having been elected as a Republican for a term of four years. That Judge Keyser is an honest, upright judge, and has honored the position to which he was elected, is conceded by the public, irrespective of party, and is attested by the fact that there is no opposition to his re-election.

Judge Cunningham R. Scott was born in Wayne county, Ohio, and is now sixty-two years old. Reared upon a farm, he worked his way through college, and subsequently studied law. After his admission to the bar he was elected prosecuting attorney; and in 1880 moved to Anamosa, Iowa, where he soon became known as an able lawyer; was twice elected district attorney. In 1874 he removed to Council Bluffs, where he maintained his high standing at the bar. He moved to Omaha in 1885, and in 1892 was elected to his present position as one of the judges of the district court.

Blunt and outspoken, Judge Scott has made bitter enemies, by whom he is hated as ardently as he is admired by the great mass of the people who believe in his rigid honesty and the purity of his motives, and who know that he is an incorruptible Judge.

Judge Jacob Fawcett was born April 9, 1847, near the village of Hazel Green, Wis., where as a poor boy he worked in the lead-mines, and studied nights to acquire an education. In 1861 he shouldered a musket and carried it in the ranks for four years. Before he was fifteen years old he was severely wounded at the battle of Shiloh; and in 1864, in the charge on Bald Hill, in front of Atlanta, was again severely wounded. When only a greenhorn he was mustered out at the close of the war, and then learned the blacksmith's trade, at which he worked for several years while pursuing his studies. In 1872 he was admitted to the bar, and entered upon the practice of law at Galena, Ill. He was soon recognized as one of the leading lawyers of the district, and was called to the bench—a position which he resigned when he moved to Omaha, in 1887.

Charles T. Dickinson was born at New Richmond, Ohio, in 1854; and graduated from the Cincinnati Law School in 1875. He immediately went to practicing law. In 1884 he came to Tekamah, Burt County, Neb., and formed a law partnership with M. R. Hopewell, which continued for three years, when Judge Hopewell retired from the firm. After serving two terms as mayor of Tekamah, and one term as County Attorney, Mr. Dickinson was elected County Judge of Burt County, in 1891. So ably did he fill the position that in 1893 he was renominated by acclamation, endorsed by the Democrats, and triumphantly elected. Judge Dickinson is an able lawyer, and if elected—as he undoubtedly will be—will be an honor to the District Bench.
