Dr. Hershey said in part: "With me religion and patriotism

to together. Next to the love of God I put the love of one's country. In countries where patriotism runs low. religion is also found at a low ebb. Our religion is what it is in the fruitage of our country's institutions and the liberties for which they stand.

"The second half of the century is drawing to a close with the Roman Catholic church as a political power constantly growing in strength. Never in the history of this country have there been so many Roman Catholics holding political positions who are Jesuits. My charges to-day are based on facts taken from Roman Catholic sources.

"A female employe of the national bureau of engraving and printing at Washington told me that she would do more for charity were she not obliged to give so much to the Roman Catholic church. The nuns of that church, she told me, visited the offices in the bureau to collect what money they could. Most of the clerks contributed, knowing their positions depended upon their submission to this species of blackmail. 
