The Vatican Among Us. Probably no Roman Catholic newspaper in the United States so accurately expresses the views of the hierarchy as the Catholic Review.

A brief extract from its latest issue may possibly brush away some of the film that obscures the vision of many Americans who, in their misplaced confidence, have been led to think that the ecclesiastical power of Rome may ultimately harmonize with American principles. We are distinctly informed by the Review that the commonly understood sentiments of our countrymen, in response to our "public schools," the "separation of church and state," and the regulation of marriage by statute law, are expressions of enmity to the Catholic Church, a "rejection of Jesus Christ," and a "driving of him out of the lives of individuals and nations." The Review charges the Free-Masons with special guilt in this matter; but we trust our Masonic friends will be able to bear up with becoming resignation under the criticism of this organ of Satolli and his master at Rome.

All we ask of our fellow-citizens is a calm, sensible consideration of the undisguised hostility of this organ of the hierarchy to the fundamental and essential ideas of our republican form of government.
