They decided to call a meeting of Irish representatives from all over the country. It is also stated that recently Patrick Ford made a demand on the Republican campaign committee for \$100,000 and full power to start and control a national Irish organization for Harrison and Morton, and that Chairman Quay was in favor of conceding the demand but was overruled."

Some time after the campaign there was a lawsuit between two of these men over the ownership of an Irish paper in New York, and the fact was actually sworn to on the witness stand that \$100,000 had been paid to the Irish leaders for their influence in the Republican campaign.
