A GRAND TIME.

That is What Every Citizen Who Attended the John L. Webster Club Meeting Say They Had.

There was a splendid gathering of Republicans and their friends at Washington hall Tuesday evening, the occasion being the presentation of an elegant silk American flag by Hon. John L. Webster to the Republican club bearing his name.

The meeting was presided over by John C. Thompson, the president of the club, whose opening address was preceded by a "march" by the Seventh Ward Orchestra. This was followed by the John L. Webster Glee Club who sang "O, Grover," which was heartily encored.

Then came the presentation of the flag. Mr. Webster spoke eloquently of the stars and stripes, under which he himself had fought upon the perilous field of battle. No more fitting emblem, he thought, could be presented to the club, as expressing his idea of what should be the aim and accomplishment of a republican organization even in times of peace. To him the flag meant all that is dear to the free American people, and he entrusted it to the care of the club, knowing that it would be ever held high in the cause of right.

Mr. Webster's address was followed by a song by the Glee Club bearing his name.

Hon. John L. Kennedy, on behalf of the club, received the flag in an appropriate and eloquent speech. He had lived under a foreign flag, had seen many other flags but none inspired the same feeling, none retained the same love and meant so much to the millions over whom they waved as the American flag. It meant liberty in its most exalted sense, and he could assure the donor that the flag he had presented would ever be at the head of the column, where its friends would be battling for the success of the Republican party.

Following Mr. Kennedy's address was a selection by the Seventh Ward Orchestra, and an address by Judge Irving F. Baxter, who took the place assigned to Rev. S. Wright Butler, who was unavoidably absent.

Mr. George Walker then rendered a cornet solo so acceptably that the large audience would not be satisfied until he had responded to an encore. Miss Addie Clinchard played an accompaniment on the piano to Mr. Walker.

The Scandinavian Glee Club followed. They responded to two encores. Judges of music pronounce the voices exceptionally fine.

Mr. John H. Johnson rendered a military march on a zither in an admirable manner, which was attested by the pronounced encore accorded him, to which he responded in a choice bit of music on the same fire instrument.

Mayor Broatch and Attorney-General A. S. Churchill were both down on the programme for an address, but as the hour was late they put the audience off with a very few well chosen words about the little red school house, the flag and our public institutions, which left no doubt in the minds of the auditors as to just where they stood on the question of Americanism as believed in today.

After they had spoken, the president asked the members of the club to give a rising vote of thanks to the young lady and gentlemen who had furnished the music, which was complied with. The meeting was then dismissed.

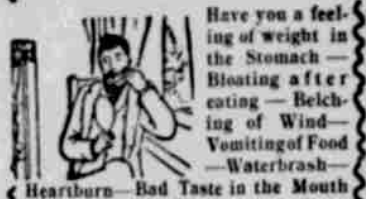
