"We condemn the support out of the publie treasury by direct appropriation or by contract of any sectarian school, reform story or other institution not owned and sontrolled by public authority.

"Believing that exemption from taxation is equivalent to a grant of public funds, we demand that no real or personal property be exempt from taxation, the title to which is it renews, and must be exactly observed sot vested in the national or state governments, or in any of their sub-divisions.

"We protest against the enlistment in the Cnited States army, navy, or the militia of any state, of any person not an actual citizen of the United States.

"We demand for the protection of our citisen laborers the prohibition of the Importa-Mon of pauper labor, and the restriction of all immigration to persons who cannot show heir ability and honest intention to become alf-supporting American citizens.

"We demand the change of the naturaliza tion laws by a repeal of the act authorizing the naturalization of minors, without a previous declaration of intention, and by providing that no alien shall be naturalized or permitted to vote in any state in the union who cannot speak the language of the land, and who cannot prove seven years' consecu-tive residence in this country from the date of his declaration of his intention.
