New Papal Delegate to America to Have

More Power Than Satelli. WASHINGTON, September 12.-Two a cablegram from Rampolla, papal secretary of state, announcing that Mgr. Martinelli will arrive in Washington the first part of October. No reason is assigned for the new delegates delay. He was expected here September On receipt of this news Cardinal Satelli announced that he would adhere to his original programme of sail ing from New York October 17.

The second communication was letter from the prefect of the progareading:

To His Eminence Francis Cardinal Satolli - Our holy father having nominated as your successor at the apostolic delegation in Washington, Most Rev. Sebastino Martinelli, prior general of the Hermits of St. Augustine, you are hereby notified that soon after his consecration as archbishop of Ephesus, Mgr. Martinelli will hasten to Washington and relieve you from your oner ous duties at the apostolic delegation there. With great affection, MICELAUS CARDINAL LEDOCHOWISKI.

This is the first efficial information that the cardinal has received on the subject of his successor.

The new delegate will be accompanied on his trip to America by the provincial of the Augustinians in the United States, Very Rev. T. B. Driscoll of Villa Nova, Pa., who has lately been visiting Rome.

According to recent letters Monsignor Martinelli will be invested with much more power than Cardinal Satolli. The delegation here will be raised to the dignity of a full ecclesiastical court of final appeals. This tribural is intended to make the American church self-governing. It will try all such cases as were hitherto referred to the congregation of the propaganda in Rome. As the pope has delegated his power to it, there can be no appeal from its decisions.

The court will consist of the delegate, a procurator, who will in all probability be appointed in time to accompany Monsignor Martinelli to Washington; an auditor, a secretary, possibly an under clerk and five canonists, to be selected from the most learned professors of canon law in the United [States. The tribunal will be carried on in exactly the same way as a judicial court of appeals. No case will come under its jurisdiction unless regularly appealed from the decision of the diocesan courts. During the time of Cardinal Satolli the delegation had no authority to try such cases. In consequence the new delegate will find a full docket and his assistants will sinecure.

Rome Intends to Conquer This Country.

In speaking of the establishment of a papal delegation at our national capital, the Catholic Freeman's Journal of New York says:

"This governmental act Americanzed the delegation, just as the tribunal in Madrid acts in the capacity of an institution that is half Roman and half Spanish. It is equivalent to a declaration of secular autonomy in the church. Its administration will come more particularly from itself, though under the distant shield of Rome and the direct patronage of the delegation. Consequently it is more than the decree by which the holy see has established the hierarchy in Engand and Holland. It is a gift which Rome gives to the United States. Now is the virile age of Roman Catholicism, and this tribunal is its living symbol. Nothing could give greater proof of the importance which Leo XIII. attaches to the American church, and consequently to the United States. A closer collaboration of the two parties and a complete organization of the church will be the starting point of an evolution whose consequences it is now impossible to foresee."
