Notice of Incorporation. Notice is hereby given that on the 23rd day of June, 1898, Orrin U. Drake, David Rich and Edson Rich organized the Exposition Catering Company and adopted articles of incorporation, and filed the same according to the laws of Nebraska, which said articles among other things provided:

First. The name of the corporation to be the Exposition Catering Company.

Second. The principal place of business to be Omaha, Nebraska.

Third. The nature of the business to be that of conducting hotels and restaurants, and the purchasing and selling of food supplies or hotel and restaurant properties.

Fourth. The capital stock of the said corporation shall be ten thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) divided into shares of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) each; all of said stock to be paid up at the commencement of the business.

Fifth. That said corporation shall begin on the 23rd day of June, 1898, and continue for a period of one year.

Sixth. The highest amount of indebtedness to which this corporation shall at any time subject itself shall not be more than two-thirds of its capital stock.

SPAIN'S DELAY TO BE SHORT

Our Terms of Peace Have Been Technically Agreed To.

NOT QUITE CLEAR TO SPAIN.

The Enemy's Questions Considered Mature and Proper by the Administration.—M. Cambon Realizes That There is No Further Chance for Hagging.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—The United States government is now waiting to hear again from Spain, and this time it is expected the answer will be final. The President has firmly declined the earnest appeal of the French ambassador to modify America's demands, except in slight and comparatively unimportant respects.

The conference yesterday afternoon at the White house, in which the President, M. Cambon and Secretary Day participated, was devoted almost entirely to a discussion of details which are regarded by the President as unimportant, and hence the requests of the French ambassador, for the most part, will be acceded to. One of these was that the commission to be appointed to settle the terms of peace shall meet outside of the United States and preferably in France.

NOT QUITE CLEAR TO SPAIN.

There is one point, however, which the Spanish authorities, judging from their communication to their representative here, fail to fully comprehend, and Secretary Day's call upon the ambassador last night was for the purpose, principally, of making perfectly clear this one point, which was that the evacuation of Cuba, Porto Rico and one of the Ladrone islands to be selected by the United States and the permanent cession to this government of all these islands except Cuba, was made a condition precedent to all peace negotiations, and that not until these terms had been fully complied with would this government consent to entertain any peace propositions whatever.

It was midnight before the concessions of the President regarding the meeting place of the peace commissioners were communicated to the Madrid authorities, so that allowing for the difference in time it was impossible for an answer to be received this morning. However, it is announced that the delay will not be long, probably at most not more than a day or two and that the answer, when it comes, will be found to be an unconditional acceptance of the terms as they now stand.

The French ambassador was not disappointed at the result of his meeting with the President. He realized that the Spanish plea for an abatement of the conditions would be useless so far as they touched the vital points of the demand. But the ambassador felt that it was his duty, regardless of his personal convictions, to lay the plea of the Spanish government before the President and that is what yesterday's meeting amounted to.

Something has been said about an effort upon the part of the Spanish government to secure some guarantee from the government that the lives and property of Spanish citizens in conquered territory shall be cared for. The idea of the administration is that no such pledge or guarantee is necessary. Assuming sovereignty over conquered territory and exercising it either through civil administration, as will be the case with Porto Rico in the end, or through military government, as will be the case in Cuba for an indefinite time, the United States assumes a strict obligation to protect the lives, interests and property of all citizens of all neutral nations, and it must be remembered that when a treaty of peace is signed the citizens of Spain, now enemies, will fall in that category.

Wyoming Democrats for Expansion.

CASPER, Wyo., Aug. 5.—The Democratic convention here yesterday adopted a platform indorsing the Chicago platform and favoring the retention of all lands on which the American flag floats. Horace C. Alger was nominated for governor.

An Australian Cable Next.

LONDON, Aug. 5.—The London Daily News says: An informal conference was recently held in London between Lord Strathearn and Count Royal, Dr. Mulock and some Australian gentlemen who are going, we believe, to be concerned in the Pacific cable, and it is reported that the dominion parliament is now disposed to support the scheme.

ORLANDO, Aug. 5.—The state Democratic convention adopted a platform condemning territorial aggression.

verse of the 1th chapter of Daniel you will see that G. has pointed out that some one would think—attempt—to change His law. That verse is as follows:

25. And he shall speak great words against the Most High, and shall wear out the seats of the Most High, and think to CHANGE TIMES AND LAWS; and they shall be given into his hand until a time and times and the dividing of time.

If you will read the whole book of Daniel you will find the general description of the beast tallies with the description of the beast in Revelation, and leaves no room to doubt that he who would think to change God's law would be the same power that John saw attain to great authority through the action of the dragon.

Many of you may continue to observe Sunday as the Sabbath, but from today the responsibility of choosing between the traditions of men and the commandments of God rests wholly with each individual who reads this article. I have done my duty. If you continue to disobey God's law, and permit yourself to be deceived by the traditions of men into following after the beast you will have to take the consequences.

We have shown that the beast of Revelation is the Roman Catholic church, referred to as the mother of harlots and as Babylon the Great with whom the nations of the earth have drunk of the wine of the wrath of her fornications.
