THE STICKLEBACK CARES FOR ITS YOUNG.

Pakes Figgs that for an Althog-Pain Them with the Fine White They Are In the Nest, Youds Them White They Are Hutgiten.

You could hardly find a better rough test of relative development in the aulmal for vegetable) world than the number of young produced and the care bestowed upon them, writes Dr. Grant Allene The fewer the offepring the higher the type, Very low animaje turn out thousands of eggs with reckless profusion, but they let them look after themselves, or be devoured by enemies, as chance will have it. The higher you go in the scale of being, the smaller the families, but the greater the amount of pains expended upon the rearing and upbringing of the roung. It is interesting to note, too, that anticipations of higher types, to to speak, often occur among lower races. An animal here and there among the simpler forms hits upon some device essentially emillar to that of some higher group with which it is really quite unrelated. There are many species of sticklebacks, but all are alike in the one point which gives them their common name, that is to say in their aggressive and protective prickliness. They are armed against all comers. The dorsal fin is partly replaced in the whole family by strong spines or "stickles," which differ in number in the different species. The special peculiarity of the male stickleback consists in the fact that he is. above all things, a model father. In his acute sense of parental responsibility he has few equals. END OF A DIVORCE STATE. North Dakota Made \$2,500,000 a Year Mending Broken Hearts.

There will be no more ninety-day divorces in North Dakota after July 1. North Dakota will have but a few advantages over other states when the law takes effect, for there are several places where divorce laws are pliable after one year's residence, says the Denver Post. The amended law has been discussed for years by the "church and temperance" people, who have argued that the divorce-whileyou-wait law was calculated to give a wrong impression of the commonwealth. They have now obtained a new law just as they obtained prohibition, but, like the latter law, the door is left open for easy access and exit. The North Dakotans are nothing if not thrifty. Easy divorce brings about \$2,500,000 into the state every year, while it only exports contented and heart-whole "residents." The wheat farmers of the legislature had their eyes on the money end of the question and threw out the year's residence as a sop to the moral enthustasts. In this way they had the backing of the banks, lawyers, hotel men and business men generally, all of whom appreciate that the divorce money furnishes business that cannot be had from any other source. There is no state where the judges are so sympathetic toward litigants in the uvorce mills. The courts define cruelty as any action on the part of the husband or wife that causes the other mental suffering. Over nine-tenths of the Dakota divorces have been granted on charges of cruelty and desertion, the former charge predominating. This new law will be convenient in one way, for there must be desertion of a year, and while obtaining a residence the charge can now be secured. In North Dakota no place amounts to anything unless it has its divorce colony. Of these the largest is Fargo, with Manden at her beels. The colony at the latter place was only started a few years ago, but it has a record due to a couple of hustling New York attorneys, who send their clients out sorrowful and bring them back happy. Mandan, being the newest colony, furnishes an interesting bit of life to the observer. There are about 1,000 citizens and a colony of 150 "residents" and "would-be residents." It was in 1896 that Mandan began its career as a divorce center, and the books of the court house show a boomtown business. From 1889 to 1896 but six pages were used in recording all the cases heard by the court. From 1896 to 1899 eighty pages have been necessary to enter the causes, and over 500 divorces have been granted. The posttion of the clerk of the court has become a gold mine; the stenographer and others who receive fees roll in wealth, while the judge has an air of prosperity and contentment. Life in the colony is not attractive, but the enforced stay to obtain a residence is looked upon as something bitter unst must be taken with the sweet that comes at the end. For, like almost all the eyes of his prospective mate, or rather mates, for our amiable friend is a good parent, but an abandoned polygamist. The first care of the male stickleback, when he has acquired a.s courting suit, is to build a suitable home for his future wives and children. So he picks up stems of grass and water weeds with his mouth and weaves them deftly into a compact nest as perfect as a bird's, though somewhat different in shape and pastern. It rather resembles a barrel,



THE FATHER AIRING THE EGGS. open at both ends, as though the bottom were knocked out; this form is rendered necessary because the eggs, when laid, have to be constantly aerated by passing a current of water through the nest, as I shall describe hereafter. No. 1 shows such a nest when completed, with the female stickleback loitering about undecided as to whether or not she shall plunge and enter it. You will observe that the fabric is woven round a fixed support of some waving water-weeds; but the cunning little architect does not trust in this matter to his textile skill alone; he cements the straws and other materials together with a gummy mortar of mucous threads secreted for the purpose by his internal organs. As soon as the building operations are polygamists, your stickleback is a terrible fighter. The males join wager of battle with one another for possession of their mates; in their fierce duels they make fearful use of the formidable spines on their backs, sometimes entirely ripping up and cutting to pieces their ill-fated adversary. The spines thus answer to the spurs of the game cock or the antlers of the deer; they are masculine weapons in the struggle for mates. Indeed, you may take it for granted that brilliant colors and decorative adjunets in animals almost invariably go with irascible tempers, pugnacious habits, and the practice of fighting for possession of the harem. The consequence is, with the sticklebacks, that many males get killed during the struggle for supremacy, so that the survivors wed half-a-dozen wives each, like little Turks that they are in their watery seraglios. Only the most beautiful and courageous fish succeed in gaining a harem of their own, and thus the wager of battle tells in the end for the advantage of the race, by eliminating the maimed, the ugly, and the cowardly, and encouraging the strong, the handsome, the enterprising and the valiant. This is pature's way of preventing degeneracy.

In No. 3 the next is seen full of eggs, and the excellent father now comes out in his best light as their guardian and protector. He watches over them with censeless care, freeing them from parasites, and warding off the attacks of would-be enemies who desire to deyour them, even though the intruder be several times his own size. The spines on his back here stand him once more in good stead; for small as ne is, the stickleback is not an antagonist to be lightly despised; he can inflict a wound which a perch or a trout knows how to estimate at its full value. But that is not all the good parent's duty. He takes the eggs out of the nest every now and then with his snout, airs them a little in the
