PROCEEDINGS OF STRAIGHT REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

Minutes of republican mass convention held in the court house in Harrison, Nebraska, October 1st, 1889.

Meeting called to order by Mr. E. J. Wilcox of Warbonnet precinct.

On motion Mr. E. J. Wilcox was elected temporary chairman and S. H. Jones temporary secretary.

It was moved and seconded that the temporary organization be made permanent. Carried.

On motion the secretary read the call published in the SIOUX COUNTY JOURNAL, setting forth the objects of the meeting.

It was moved by L. J. Simmons that the order of business before the convention be in accordance with the published call. Seconded and carried.

The selection of candidates to fill the county offices being first in order the following resolution was offered by S. R. Story, of Antelope precinct:

Whereas, on the 6th day of August, 1889, the people of Sioux county in delegate convention, assembled in Five Points precinct, Sioux county, placed in nomination a full county ticket composed of the following persons to-wit:

- Conrad Lindenman, for county clerk;
- Martin Gayhart, for county treasurer;
- S. Barker, for county judge;
- Thomas Reidy, for sheriff;
- Alanson Southworth, for superintendent of public instruction;
- Albert R. Lew, for surveyor;
- Charles Grove, for commissioner from 2nd district;
- John A. Green, commissioner from 3rd district;
- George J. Shafer, for coroner. And

Resolved, that we, as republicans in mass convention assembled, do hereby endorse the said nominees of the peoples convention and pledge ourselves to do all in our power to secure the election of the said persons nominated at the peoples convention, and that they be declared the choice of the straight republicans of Sioux county.

It was moved by H. T. Conley that the resolution be adopted. Seconded and carried.

On motion the following were elected delegates to the state convention: L. J. Simmons, Geo. Walker and C. E. Holmes.

On motion the following were elected delegates to the senatorial convention: George Olinger, Thomas Devenport, J. H. Cook.

Motion made by Chas. E. Verity that the delegates elected to the senatorial convention be empowered to represent Sioux county at the representative convention. Seconded and carried.

Under the head of the selection of the county central committee a motion was made and seconded that the chairman and secretary be elected at large from the county. Carried.

It was moved by H. T. Conley and seconded by C. E. Verity that L. J. Simmons be elected chairman of the county central committee. Carried.

On motion S. H. Jones was elected secretary of the county central committee.

On motion it was decided that the representatives from the various precincts select from their precinct one member of the county central committee, and hand the names to the secretary.

The following names were selected as members of the county central committee for ensuing year.

- Bowen precinct, Chas. E. Holmes.
- Antelope " S. R. Story.
- Bodare " Eli Smith.
- Montrose " H. Jurgens.
- White River " A. E. Gates.
- Cottonwood " N. B. Raines.
- Hat Creek " A. Southworth.
- Lower Ranning Water pre. J. H. Cook.
- Sheep Creek " T. B. Snyder.
- Five Points " Harrison Beane.
- Warbonnet " G. W. Tool.

The following resolutions were offered by L. J. Simmons and unanimously adopted.

"We, the republicans of Sioux county, Nebraska, in mass convention assembled, do hereby renew our allegiance to the principles of the republican party as set forth in the national and state platforms of 1888.

"Believing that the purity of the ballot is the great safeguard of our nation, we condemn all acts of fraud or intimidation against the voters in the exercise of the rights vouchsafed to them by the law and we hereby pledge our time, talent and substance for the prosecution of any one who shall attempt to interfere with a free ballot and a fair count.

"We heartily indorse the appointment of Judge Lewis A. Groff as commissioner of the general land office, for in honoring Judge Groff, President Harrison has honored Nebraska and thereby honored himself. We indorse the prompt action taken by the administration at all times where the rights of the United States or her citizens needed protection."

It was moved and seconded that this convention confirm the selection of the county central committee as handed in by the delegates present from the various precincts. Carried.

On motion the precincts not having representation on the county central committee be filled by the committee selected. Seconded and carried.

For the purpose of securing a fair and honest election a sum amounting to several hundred dollars was pledged for the purpose of prosecuting any attempt at fraud or intimidation.
