The New York Tribune recently represented the "Man in the Moon" as paying a visit to our planet and commenting as follows upon the drink system: "These fluids, you say, intoxicate; make people crazy, furious, silly and wretched; lead them into crime and reduce them to misery. Up in the moon we should consider that sort of fluid a poison. Here you legalize its sale and you license 'men of good moral character' to traffic in it. How can you find a man of 'good moral character' willing to poison his fellow? Do you license good moral persons to commit murder, or to rob or to swindle?"—Pertinent questions for real men to consider.

Ought not the following calculations to make us ashamed of ourselves? With the money spent on drink in Great Britain there could be maintained 600,000 missionaries at \$250 a year, 500,000 schoolmasters at \$100, 5,000 churches at \$2,000, 500 schools at \$200. It would give to the world 200,000,000 shilling Bibles, 500,000,000 tracts at 4 shillings a hundred, would give 100,000 widows £20 a year, and 200,000 poor families £10 a year. Which do we value most—our glasses or our libans?

Where are our young men? Some startling facts in answer to this question was recently presented in the Christian Standard. There are about 30,000 young men in the nation's capital. Of these, not quite ten per cent are communicants in churches. On one prayer-meeting evening 168 men, all told, attended religious services in ten of the leading churches, and ten of the larger young people's meetings. The same evening 365 young men were seen entering ten of the 1,000 saloons during a single hour. Eight hundred and eighteen were present at two of the lowest theatres, at one of which there was an estimated attendance of 100 boys under sixteen.

What wonder, with such sorrowful and almost maddening facts as the above pressing against the heart-strings of the women of the state and nation that they should meet in convention, as well as in the quiet of many a desolated home, and pray and deliberate and vote and work for the putting down of their cruel and relentless foe, the liquor power? And what wonder if the speakers, grand and noble women, should sometimes break out with the bitter wail: "We appeal to you, oh christian men! moral men! remember that as there will be a crowning day there will be also a judgment day, and may God help good men to vote as they pray, and to help outraged women and helpless children. The home must be protected, if the nation survives, is the thought of every mother's heart."

The Indian agencies are 61 in number. The number of houses occupied by Indians are 21,232. The estimated number of Indians living in Alaska is 30,000. The number of Indians living on and cultivating land is 9,692. The total Indian population of the United States is 247,673. There are 19 Indian training schools in the Union. The number of Indians in the United States wearing citizen's dress are 81,621. The number of Indians in the United States who can read Indian languages is 10,027.—St. Paul Globe.
