The last night of each month is excepted. Should the last night fall on Sunday, then the Saturday night preceding is excepted. We do this only for the accommodation of parties wishing to enter homesteads, and we urgently request that no business be presented other than homestead entries and the necessary examination of plats connected therewith. Should the public persist in offering business that can be transacted by agents during regular hours, we will be compelled to refuse such business, and very likely be obliged to revoke this privilege.
