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NOTES FOR THE DOCTORS.

Dr. Koch's lymph may not, according to German law, be patented. In a recent article in the Nineteenth Century, Dr. Snow points to the fact that cancer is increasing. The death rate, which in 1864 was 285 per million, had risen to 610 in 1888.

Sir Morell Mackenzie objects to large hospitals on the ground that the added violence of germs from the bodies of many patients is as dangerous as that of those emanating from dead bodies.

Dr. Sullivan Whitney, the first American physician who manufactured homeopathic medicines, has just died at his home in Newtonville, Mass., at the age of eighty-three. He was graduated from Harvard Medical School nearly fifty years ago.

Drs. Brix and Pieg, of Nantes, France, have been conducting consumption-cure experiments on the observation that goats are exempt from the disease, and they now announce that consumptive patients injected with goat blood have been greatly benefited.

Dr. R. H. Eccles points out that the danger of diseases is as a rule in the direct ratio of the carelessness with which they are regarded. He says that diseases may be classed as more or less fatal as people are afraid of them, and seek proper advice to both prevent and cure.

The physicians of Havana are successfully inoculating new arrivals in Cuba against yellow fever, through mosquitoes that have embroiled themselves by stinging yellow-fever patients. Fifty-two cases of immediate inoculation have been followed up. Of them only about 2 percent, either previously contracted the disease, with a mortality of less than 2 percent.

Water kept in a room for awhile is unfit for use, and ice water should always be kept covered up.

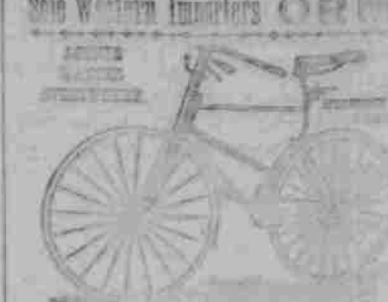

A RESURFACED joint in a sewer or drain pipe may be tested by wrapping it with a single layer of white muslin moistened with a solution of acetate of lead. As the gas escapes through the meshes of the cloth, it will be blackened by the sulphur compounds.

The danger of infection from impure water is said to be only slightly reduced by filtration through sand, bacteria passing through at all times, but in larger numbers just after the filter has been cleaned and again after it has been used for some time.
