Sioux county has her Sunday clothes on every day in the week.

Break, break, break is the burden of the song of the farmers of late and their lay is the lay of the breaking plow.

The mining excitement near Casper, Wyo., may have the effect of getting better service on this line of railroad. Such a thing would be very acceptable.

The May floods appear to have simply been a forerunner of the June freshets. The rivers all over the south are still rising and great damage is expected to result.

A mine disaster occurred at Birkenberg last week in which about four hundred people lost their lives. Many of the bodies were almost destroyed, the greater part of them being beyond recognition.

A cyclone visited McCook last Saturday. A number of buildings were blown down, among them a church where about fifty children were gathered to practice for an entertainment. Several persons were seriously injured.

On last Saturday James G. Blaine resigned his position as secretary of state and member of the cabinet of President Harrison. The resignation was at once accepted by the president. Neither of the men would say anything concerning the action and it was not a matter of conjecture as to its bearing on the presidential nomination. At all events the Anti-Harrison men went wild over the report and used it to advance their plans to defeat the president for re-nomination. It is singular that Blaine should resign just on the eve of the meeting of the convention for such an act at that time could not but tend to muddle matters.

It is reported that a new oil syndicate has been organized which is backed by even more capital than the great Standard company. The new concern has already got control of a large number of oil wells and will construct pipe lines from the principal oil fields to the seaboard. The syndicate is composed of Chicago and London capitalists and the probabilities are that the Standard oil trust will soon have the most formidable competitor it has ever had. Should the affair take a turn whereby the oil fields of Wyoming will be developed it would be a great advantage to this section of country. At all events the result of the competition will most likely reduce the price of oil.

Major Wolcott, the leader of the band of murderers who invaded Johnson county, Wyo., to rid the locality of settlers, was permitted to go to Omaha a few days ago to consult Senator Manderson and try to get his influence to have the cattle country of Wyoming declared under martial law. Senator Manderson has been a personal friend of Wolcott, but it is hardly likely that the man who is recognized as leader of the senate will lend his official influence to help a lot of cold-blooded assassins bring about a state of affairs which is altogether unbecoming. The cattlemen got themselves into their trouble, let them take the consequences.

A great deal of excitement has been caused of late at Casper, Wyo., over the rich mineral found at Casper mountain near that place. There was a regular stampede for the locality and the prospects are that a good deal of work will be done there in taking out ore. It is a settled fact that all the country north-west of here is rich in oil, coal and valuable minerals which will be developed quite rapidly in the near future and such development will be of much value to this country. The miners will have to have something to eat and Sioux county will find a ready market, close at hand, for the products of her soil. Let the good work go on. It will add to the prosperity of all.

A Kearney man has a plan of making a canal along the Platte river from its mouth to the junction of the north and south forks of the streams and from that point have a canal along each fork to their source in Colorado. The two streams head near each other and he would cut through and make a circuit. The canal would be large enough for freight boats and wherever practicable the water would be utilized for power purposes as it is at Kearney. It looks a little wild at present, but may prove a success. Col. Patterson, who is the originator of the scheme, was the man who first figured out the Kearney canal, and for years he was laughed at as a crank, but he has seen his theory made a practical paying fact.

Jimtown, the main business part of Creede mining camp was almost totally destroyed by fire Sunday morning. The loss is estimated at nearly a million dollars.

Reproductive Power of Weeds.
Farmers who allow the weeds on their plantations to go to seed have little idea, many of them, of the labor and trouble they are storing up for themselves. Some curious experimentalist has been at the trouble of counting the seeds produced by a single plant of some of the commonest varieties of weeds with the following rather startling results: Wild carrot, 1,200; dandelion, 1,500; chickweed, 2,000; cockle, 3,200; camphor, 3,425; chess, 3,500; dock, 3,700; ragweed, 4,372; groundsel, 6,500; ox eye daisy, 9,600; mallow, 16,500; mother-wort, 18,000; fox-tail, 19,500; sow thistle, 19,000; mustard, 31,000; Canadian thistle, 42,000; red poppy, 50,000; burdock, 400,328; purslane, 500,000; lambs' quarters, 825,000. *New Orleans Picayune.*

Weakening on Free Trade.
LONDON, May 18.—Lord Salisbury, in a speech which he delivered today at Hastings, counselled the workmen to follow the example set them by nations, and substitute arbitration for the violent methods which were sometimes adopted for settling labor disputes.

He said that a grave matter in which the prosperity of the country was involved was the question of free trade. "England," he declared, "only maintains the position she occupies by the vast industries existing here, but a danger is growing up. Fifty years ago everybody believed that free trade had conquered the world, and prophesied that every nation would follow the example of England. The results, however, are not what had been expected. Despite the prophecies of the free trade advocates, foreign nations are adopting protection. They are excluding us from their markets and are trying to kill our trade. And this state of things appears to grow worse. We live in an age of war tariffs. An important point is that while nations are negotiating to claim each other's commercial favor, none is anxious about the favor of Great Britain because Great Britain has striped herself of the armor and weapons with which the battle is to be fought.

"The attitude we have taken in regarding it disloyal to the glorious and sacred doctrines of free trade to levy duties on anybody for the sake of anything we get thereby may be noble, but is not businesslike. [Cheers.] On these terms you will and do get nothing. If you intend to hold your own in this conflict of tariffs you must be prepared to refuse nations who injure you access to your markets. We complain most of the United States; and it so happens that the United States mainly furnishes us with articles which are essential to the good of the people, and with raw material which is essential to our manufacturers. We cannot exclude either without a serious injury to ourselves. I am not prepared, in order to punish other countries, to inflict dangerous wounds on ourselves. We must confine ourselves to those matters whereon we will not suffer much whether importation continues or diminishes. While we cannot raise the price of food and raw material, there is an enormous mass of imports, such as wine, spirits, silk, gloves and laces, from countries beside the United States, which are merely luxuries, and of which a diminished consumption could be risked in order to secure access to the markets of our neighbors. I shall expect to be excommunicated for propounding such a doctrine, but I am bound to say that I think the free traders have gone too far."
