Republican State Convention.

The republican electors of the state of Nebraska are requested to send delegates from their several counties to meet in convention at the city of Lincoln, August 4, 1892, at 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for the following state offices:

Governor; Lieutenant governor; Secretary of state; Auditor of public accounts; Treasurer; Superintendent of public instruction; Attorney General; Commissioner of public lands and buildings; Eight presidential electors; And to transact such other business as may come before the convention.

THE APPOINTMENT. The several counties are entitled to representation as follows, being based upon the vote cast for George H. Hastings for attorney general in 1890, giving one delegate at large to each county and one for each 100 votes and the major fraction thereof:

SIOUX COUNTY'S STOCK INDUSTRY.

A paper on the subject prepared and read by Wm. J. A. Mann, before the Stock County Alliance, July 26, 1892.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:—A duty has been placed upon my shoulders that I am totally unable to give an iota of the justice and prominence it deserves, before your honorable body. It is a question of vital importance to every individual that is identified with the agricultural pursuits of our section of the Northwest, for it is one branch of that industry that must be connected with the raising of grain to make it profitable with any degree of certainty.

Some dozen years ago, when I settled on White river, a steer could be produced on the range and delivered in Chicago for \$7.50 at a profit. I got this information from one of the largest stock-raisers in this section of the county at that time. Ordinary steers at that time brought from \$30 to \$35 per head. So you can imagine the enormous profits there were in the stock business a dozen years ago.

When at liberty to roam over our beautiful prairies and valleys and fatten on the luxuriant natural grasses the percentage of loss was very small during the time they had to live on snow and air, and the cattle barons grew rich.

But the question we wish analyzed is how we can make the business profitable at the present time. My humble opinion can be summed up in a few words. Necessarily the herds must be small as the choice available land is taken up by actual settlers. To make up for numbers we must make it an object to produce a better article.

For instance, the horse. The broncho has filled the place as a servicable animal to man and he must be superseded by something that will meet the present requirements. And one breeder on a small scale can not diversify his several kinds to suit the wants of the public or private buyers.

Consequently it is of vital importance that we should get rid of our inferior horses as fast as possible and replace them with the best we can possibly afford. Although I am no lover of this piano-legged horse of Europe, if the market demands a horse of that class and if a man is situated to raise the heavy draft horse, I beg of him to use very best sires that can be procured.

The court has decided that the cattle baron murderers of Wyoming are to be tried at Cheyenne. That is considered as in favor of the raiders for trial will take place right among their friends. It looks very much as if the gang of invaders stood in with the officials and it is quite likely that the wrath of the people will fall on those who have lent their official influence to assist the law-breakers.

The signs of the times indicate that the legislative nominees of the republican party in the northwest will be W. W. Wood for senator and L. A. Brower of Chadron for representative. Both are known to be men of standing, ability and integrity and will add strength to the ticket, and if care is used and the ticket made up of such men there will be no question as to the success of the party at the polls.

Another little piece of independent consistency is noticeable these days. The independent state conventions pass strong resolutions denouncing both of the old parties in unmeasured terms, and straightway enter into a fusion with democracy. These things only go to prove the fact that this alliance party is simply a cat's paw of the bourbon party to wrest a few western states out of the republican column.—Broken Bow Leader.

Arrangements have been made by a company of capitalists to manufacture alcohol from West Indies molasses. The cost is small and the profits enormous. The molasses is admitted free of duty in its crude state and hence it will be used for making alcohol in place of the western grain which has been used in the past. Congress would be working in the interest of the great west if it would put a good, high tariff on the crude molasses.

A democratic exchange speaks of the "clean administration" of Grover Cleveland. What! Is Attorney General Garland's connection with the Pan-Electric scandal so soon forgotten? Homestead has a population of nearly 5,000, of whom over 3,000 are men over 21 years old; yet at 1887 fall's state census it had only a few more than 600 votes. This is because the bulk of its males are unaturalized foreigners. This is a fact worth pondering.—Toledo Blade.

Again it is reported that there is a prospect of getting better team service on this line. It is stated that a corps of surveyors is at work on a line from Casper to Soda Springs, a point sixty miles beyond the present terminus of the E. & M. V. It is understood that it is the owners of the soda springs who are doing the work and that they will build the line and operate it in conjunction with the Elkhorn. It matters not who builds or owns the extension the people about this branch will be greatly pleased to have any arrangement made whereby better service can be had. The way it is now a person coming here gets all worn out dragging along from Chadron and does not feel favorably impressed with the country, but if he was brought up at a good rate of speed in a comfortable car he would be in better spirits on his arrival. It is hoped the road will be extended and good services put on in the near future.

The Homestead strike troubles do not appear to be any nearer a settlement than they were a week ago. A number of non-union men have been employed but not enough to operate near all the works. On last Saturday an attempt was made by a man by the name of Berkman, a Russian Jew, to kill H. C. Frick, the chairman of the Carnegie steel company. The would-be assassin is an anarchist and went from New York to perform the act. Frick was struck by two bullets and received four ugly gashes from a dagger, but will recover. The man was arrested and attempted to blow his own head off with dynamite. He is not one of the former employees of the steel company but took the action he did out of pure cussedness. The workmen at other mills of the steel company have gone out on a strike, simply on account of sympathy with those at Homestead, notwithstanding that they had contracted for a year yet to come. Of all the foolish acts of organized labor that appears the worst. Why a lot of men who are satisfied with their position and wages and have contracted to work a certain length of time should break their contract, throw down their tools and go on a strike simply because a misunderstanding has arisen between the laborers and employers at a factory miles away cannot be determined. Another bad feature is the attempts made by the strikers to prevent other men from going to work in their places. There is no law to compel them to work if they do not want to, but they have no right to say that other men shall not work if they so desire.
