HOFITABLE VOICES.

What Choir Singers Are "aid in the Large Cities of the Country.

A soprano, in an average city, will be paid, as a beginner, anywhere from \$200 to \$300 per annum, writes E. Aline Opgood in the Ladies' Home Journal. As she will average from \$500 to \$500. Boston pays about \$100 per annum better to choir singers than any other city in my knowledire. Several sopranos there receive yearly salaries of \$1,000 and \$1,200,

and a few SL500 A woman with a good contralto voice will begin at an annual salary of \$200. which, if she is successful, may rise to an average of \$500. There are two churches in Philadelphia, I believe. which pay their contraitos \$400; but this, in cities outside of Boston, which, as with seprance, average about \$200 higher, is unusual. And even a genuine alto-that rarest of things in these days-will command but from \$200 to \$400 per annum. The Hub. of course, does better than this, by adding \$200; but even with this addition. none of these salaries appear precisely extravagant, or to admit of much luxury in living, and salaries are rarely in-creased. Should a rival church make an offer for a voice, if the first church is desirous of retaining it, the rival's price is onthid, and the voice retained. But this is the only reason, of which I have knowledge, for increasing sal-aries. However, it must be remembered that this salary is paid for singing only at two mer ices, and for attendance at one or two rehearsals a week. All the rest of the singer's time is her own to dispose of as she pleases. Prove she an apt pupil to her new master, he will send to her, for instructions, scholars whom he has not the time to teach. Or she may secure engagements to sing at different church concerts, or, laying aside her music, may take to sewing, painting, decorating, or any of the many ways in which girls are able to make a hving. No work must be undertaken which will in any way conflict with the choir singing, for this, remember, is the reason of her existence. She is first and before all class a singur; that is her profession. Let this never be forgotten.
