Hickman, Landreth's white, Tuscan island red and ironclad. The distribution will be made in quantities of twenty pounds each, and will be delivered to the express office in the city of Lincoln, neatly sacked, free of charge. The receiver must pay the charges from that point, which is the only expense to him.
