It is against the law to use a seine and when any one is so devoid of principle and feeling as to treat the small fish as above stated he should be punished severely. If those who know of such vandalism would prosecute the offenders a few times a stop would be effected and some move should be made to protect the fine fish with which the waters of the county are being stocked. In some counties organizations are made for this express purpose and something of that kind would be a good thing here. The fish will, in a few years, be an important item of food and they should not be destroyed.

COMMISSIONERS' RECORD.

HARRISON, NEB., April 2, 1894.

Board of county commissioners met at adjournment. Present: Commissioners Weber, Johnson and Frieshoff and clerk.

Minutes of last meeting read and corrected as follows: The annual statement of the following road overseer was audited and allowed and certificates ordered drawn on the different road district funds:

J. H. Sewlin, overseer road district No. 4, 11 1/2 Creek precinct, claimed \$500, allowed \$7.00.

W. H. Eshery, overseer road district No. 3, Cottonwood precinct, claimed \$25.00, allowed \$7.00.

On motion A. E. Dew was requested to resign his office as sheriff or cease performing the clerical work in the treasurer's office contrary to section 2708 Consolidated Statutes of Nebraska, or show cause why he should not.

Commissioner Johnson voting no.

On motion the minutes of last meeting were approved as corrected.

The resignation of John Meinburt as road overseer for road district No. 3, Five Points precinct, was accepted.

The following appointments were made: John F. Meyer overseer of highways for road district No. 5, Five Points precinct.

Thomas Doyle overseer road district No. 7, Bolare precinct.

A southworth justice of the peace for Five Points precinct.

The following official bonds were approved:

E. A. Hasequist road overseer district No. 12, Bowen precinct.

Solomon R. story member soldiers relief commission, 1st commissioner district.

On motion the treasurer be and he hereby is ordered to transfer the sum of \$30.93 from the bridge fund of 1893 to the bridge fund of 1894.

On motion the clerk is hereby authorized to receive bids for the construction of a sidewalk five feet wide, beginning at the southeast corner of the court house lots, thence north along the east line of lots to the north side of the court house steps, thence west to court house steps. Bids to be filed with the clerk on or before 12 o'clock, noon, on April 10, 1894. Plans may be seen at the clerk's office. Commissioner Johnson to be and he hereby is authorized to reject any or all bids or to accept the best bid and also to superintend the construction of the walk and also the repairing of the court house roof.

On motion THE SIOUX COUNTY JOURNAL is designated as the official paper for the unexpired year of 1894.

The application of Samuel W. Carey for the refunding of taxes claimed to have been improperly applied by the treasurer of Sioux county for the payment of taxes on the s. 1/4, nw. 1/4 and e. 1/2, sw. 1/4, and nw. 1/4, of sec. 13, township 10, range 53, for the year 1892, applicant claiming that said land was not taxable in said year, the money having been sent up for the payment of taxes on another tract of land, was taken up and duly considered by the board and rejected, for the reason that said applicant did not make a demand in writing on the county treasurer for the refunding of said taxes within thirty days after the same was paid, and also for the reason that said taxes were not paid under protest.

On motion the office of county treasurer of Sioux county, Neb., does not require a deputy, clerk or assistant whatever. In said office, it is therefore ordered as the sense of this board that the county treasurer of Sioux county Nebraska be and he hereby is required to perform all the duties of his said office in person.

On motion the clerk be and he is hereby ordered to send to the treasurer a notice of the action taken by the board.

On motion the sheriff be and he hereby is prohibited from having his office in the office of county treasurer.

HARRISON, NEB., April 3, 1894.

Board of county commissioners met at adjournment. Present: Commissioners Weber, Johnson and Frieshoff and clerk.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

The board proceeded to obtain the information necessary in order to select the names of persons from which to draw a petit jury to serve at the May, 1894, term of the district court. The names of all persons who were drawn as jurors for the past two years were first obtained. The abstract of votes cast at the last general election was examined and the total number of votes polled in the county was found to be 471, but Sheep Creek precinct was found not to have held an election in 1892. The assessors book for Sheep Creek precinct for the year 1893 was consulted to find the number of persons eligible for jurors from said precinct and eleven such persons were found, which added to 471 makes 482, which number divided by 24, the number of persons to be listed for jury purposes, it was found that one person could be listed as juror for each eight and one-thirtieth electors found in each precinct.

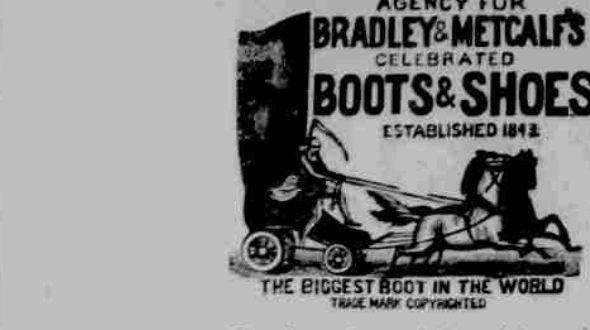
