The summary of the bill given in the press dispatch is sufficient to show that it posing, as it does, a general survey and the determination of specific conditions upon which it is desirable to have more definite and accurate information than now exists.

The report accompanying the bill, con prepared by Representative Sweet of Idaho, who has shown an earnest geal in this matter of promoting irrigation, is referred to as one of the most concise and interesting discussions of the subject from a western standpoint, ever presentted. It urges that the consideration of the subject has been too long delayed. due to the indifference if not opposition of the east and south, and the reasons that have actuated these sections are held to be insufficent to justify putting a check to the development of the west. It is to be apprehended that the objection to a national system of irrigation, on the score of the enormous expenditure that would be involved, will not be easily overcome, though the opposition to this policy has thus far been able to suggest no entirely practicable and unobjectionable plan. The ccheme of the reclaiming the arid region gradually. the government disposing of the lands as the work proceeded and applying this revenue to its continuance. In this way the purchasers of the lands would pay the whole cost of reclaiming them. As to the other objection, that the reclamation of the arid regions would result in increasing agricultural competition and still further reducing the prices of agricultural products, if it is worthy of any serious consideration, it would be an almost perpetual bar to opening up these regions to settlement and utilizing them It is further recommended that the state for increasing the wealth and power of Col


