The establishment of a beet sugar factory at Chadron is just cause for the editor of THE JOURNAL to congratulate himself for more than one reason.

In the second place it verifies a statement made by THE JOURNAL in its issue of July 4, 1889, which follows:

The question of raising beets for the manufacture of sugar is being agitated in Nebraska more than ever before.

The courts have held that the income tax is all right and must be paid, but so far no blanks have been received at this office from the collector.

MURRAH FOR SUGAR BEETS!

CHADRON HAS SECURED FOUR FACTORIES.

A \$300,000 Beet Sugar Factory Heads the Procession.

The long, hard struggle by the people of Chadron to secure factories was ended a few days ago by the signing of the articles by the capitalists who are to construct and operate them.

The other three factories are, one for chicory with a capacity of thirty tons a day; one for starch which will consume one thousand bushels of grain or potatoes a day; one for glucose which will consume one thousand bushels of grain a day.

The entire plant is estimated to cost about \$1,200,000. That means a great deal of work for those who are in need of it in the construction of the buildings and it means that a living will be practically assured to all who are located so as to deliver material grown to the factories.

THE JOURNAL will give its readers information as to the progress of the move and everything that will be of interest to those who desire to raise material for the factories.
