The seed will be furnished by the company and is to be paid for at the time of delivery of the beets to the factory. The company will furnish seeder-

None of that is expensive so that no one need to hesitate to engage in growing beets on account o the cost to prepare for it. The factors are a sure thing and all who are withshipping distance should prepare to groverops for them as it will be certain to prove profitable. Superintendent Har ris has taken the matter of freights up with the department and will get as low a rate on beets to the factory from outside points as he can. It is estimated by conservative people of Chadron that no less than five hundred people will location that vicinity by May first.
