The Atkinson *Graphic* has been disposed of by Geo. A. McArthur to Hon. R. H. Jenness, now a member of the legislature from Douglas county. If the new proprietor keeps the paper up to what it has been he will have to hustle. The move is made necessary on the part of Mr. McArthur by the ill-health of his family.

A woman in Boyd county was lynched a few days ago after having been outraged. Her husband had been sent to the insane asylum about a year ago and she was living alone. The dastardly crime is said to have been committed by cattle rustlers about whom she knew something which they feared to have told. It is hoped that the feds will be brought to justice. It seems that the time has arrived when the strength and majesty of the law must be shown. Bands of organized outlaws are to be allowed to murder and pillage at will no one will be safe. A few cases of swift and unrelenting justice will put stop to such crimes.

The bill which is before the legislature which provides that less than all of the members of a jury may make up a verdict seems to be a good move. There is no one who has watched the proceedings of the courts but has recognized that there is something wrong with the present jury system. Some go so far as to claim that it would be in the interest of both justice and equity if all cases were tried by the judges. That is most too far, but some way by which litigation could be lessened and the rights of all still be protected, would be appreciated by the masses.

The senate in committee of the whole on last Saturday decided to pass the bill abolishing the office of county attorney and returning to the district attorney system. In speaking on the bill Senator Stewart insisted that the county attorney system is an imposition on the smaller counties, where it is customary to pension some poor attorney to keep him from starving, and if advice worth having is wanted, the county board goes to a good attorney and pays a fee. He left it about right that time except that he did not need to confine the statement to the smaller counties.

A man at Liberty was arrested recently on the charge of burglary and taken before a justice of the peace. The defendant asked for a jury and obtained one. The case was tried and the jury brought in a verdict of guilty and the justice imposed a sentence of imprisonment. The attorney for the defendant took the case to the district court and the prisoner was discharged and the judge on his own motion appointed a committee of the attorneys to investigate the actions of the attorney who prosecuted the man and the justice before whom the case took place was called to appear before the committee. It is said that if what is reported is found to be true by the committee action will be brought for the disbarment of the attorney who prosecuted the case.

It is a little amusing to a newspaper man sometimes to witness the squirming induced by the publication of a plain unvarnished statement, necessary in a mere local news item. The party imagines himself aggrieved and rushes at the man of pen, shears and pastepot, with blood in his eye and thunder between his teeth, notwithstanding the fact that the editor has no bias in that way and merely acted in his capacity as a vendor of news. And it may not be out of place to state here that those who do the least for a paper and affect to ignore or despise its influence are the first to set up a howl if the paper inadvertently mentions them in a manner they consider derogatory to their well being or interest.—*Lusk Herald*.

Gov. Holcomb has vetoed the change of venue bill as passed by the legislature. It is charged by some that it was done on partisan grounds. The bill was to enable the state to take a change of venue in certain cases and was rushed along as fast as circumstances would admit that it might be taken advantage of in the Barrett Scott murder cases in Holt county. It has been noted all along that the populists have opposed the measure and some reports have been that it was done in the interest of the murderers. It passed both houses and went to the chief executive for his signature, but instead of approval he vetoed it. It is evident with the oath-bound organization which is known to exist in Holt county it will be out of this question for justice to be secured for the public in the cases growing out of the Barrett Scott matter and, it does not as if the situation was becoming a party to both of the outlaws.

The special edition of the Chadron *Journal* was a good one and the city and county which it represented will be benefitted by it. Such editions as a rule are a great deal of trouble and bring but small returns to the publisher and therefore the enterprise shown is all the more commendable.

The action of Dr. Hay in resisting the appointment of a successor when the statute provides that the term shall be for six years and the present incumbent has only held the place for a third of that time, is calling forth a good deal of comment. It is claimed that the rule has been to change the superintendent with the administration. If that has been done contrary to law it should be stopped. If the appointment properly belonged to Gov. Holcomb as a part of the patronage of his office he should not be thwarted in his work.
