District Court.

On Monday Judge Kinkaid and Reporter King arrived and the spring term of district court has been grinding ever since. A little routine business has been done but the most of the time has been occupied by the trial of James Slattery on the charge of killing range cattle. A jury was secured from the regular panel and is composed of the following: Wm. Martin, John Serres, Foster Speas, Johnnie Alcorn, Earnest Bunge, Eben Cowlishaw, Claus Christensen, H. S. Clough, H. C. Cottman, J. B. Bradley, Peter Raben and Herman Koorath. The case is being prosecuted by A. G. Fisher, assisted by the county attorney, and W. H. Westover is for the defense. The case is being closely contested and no one can predict the result. The testimony is all in and it will likely be given to the jury in a short time. As all other jury cases have been continued court will likely adjourn very shortly after this case is decided, unless the jury disagree and another trial is made necessary.

A complete report of the doings of the court will be given next week.

Among the attorneys present were Messrs. Fisher, Bane and Crites of Chadron, Fanning and Daily of Crawford, Doward of Rapid City, South Dakota, and Westover of Rockville.

After an absence of a couple of years it is evident that Judge Kinkaid is as popular as a prosiding judge and as a man as he ever was here. His reporter J. J. King, made his first visit this term and his conduct and attention to duty has made him many friends.
