It is quite likely that trout fishing is ruined in that part of the stream for a good while to come. Some method ought to be devised to prevent any more such mishaps and also to give the trout a chance to recover somewhat what they have lost in numbers.

Ordinance No. 35. An ordinance for the levy of taxes for the village of Harrison, Nebraska, for the municipal fiscal year of 1896.

SECTION 1. That there is hereby levied upon all the taxable property within the corporate limits of the village of Harrison a tax as follows:

For general fund 10 mills For sinking fund and interest 7 mills For water fund 4 mills For special debt fund to apply on judgments 12 mills

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law. Passed and approved July 2, 1895.
