It will be necessary for the stock-owners to organize and pay a reward for the killing of the pests. They destroy many hundreds of dollars worth of stock every year and increase in numbers rapidly.

—It is reported that Surveyor-elect Ellis will not qualify and that the pop candidate for that office in Dawes county who was defeated at the last election, has been here during the past week looking up the matter with a view to establishing a residence in Sioux county and as soon as that is accomplished have himself appointed to fill the vacancy. He seems to see a chance to work up some business for which the county will have to pay him if he can have his plans carried out. The scheme is a very nice one for him, but it may be that the commissioners will not take kindly to it. With the valuation and population of the county on the decrease the board is not likely to become a party to a scheme to add to the expenses of the county. The experience of the past of putting new-comers whose object in coming here was mainly to get office, has not been such that a reputation would meet with the approval of the people. A number of people have come to Sioux county for the purpose of getting office, and as a rule have been turned down by the people, but no case can be recalled where a man displayed the nerve that appears in this instance.
