The Twenty-fourth annual meeting of the Nebraska state press association will be held at Lincoln January 30th and 31st.

Lieutenant Swift committed suicide at Fort Robinson last week. He had been in charge of the post canteen for some time but was relieved and an investigation was being made.

Sioux County, THE LAND OF THE HOME-STEADER. Free Homes for More Than 5,000 Men. A new county with schools, churches, railroads, etc., AND 800,000 ACRES YET OPEN TO HOMESTEAD ENTRY. Contains over forty-five miles of rail road and has no county bonds.

Sioux county is the northwest county of Nebraska. It is about thirty miles east and west but about seventy miles north and south and contains OVER 1,300,000 ACRES of land. There are more bright, sparkling, small streams in the county than can be found in the same area elsewhere in the state. It has more pine timber in it than all the rest of the state combined.
