On last Saturday Frederick Werleman went before Judge Wilson and filed a complaint charging Lewis Pfost with assault and battery. He gave security for costs and a warrant was issued and placed in the hands of Sheriff Bartlett. On Monday the defendant was brought up, the witnesses also being on hand. The defendant demanded a jury and the case was continued until Tuesday, and resulted in a verdict of not guilty. The defendant was discharged and the costs taxed against the complaining witness. County Attorney Guthrie prosecuted and W. O. Patterson defended. The trouble grew out of the possession of a piece of land.
The annual meeting of the assessors as provided by law will occur on Tuesday, March 17th at the office of the county clerk. Failure to attend the meeting by an assessor vacates the office, so all should be on hand. The basis of valuation of property is to be fixed at that time and that is important. It rests to a very great extent with the assessors whether or not the county shall be able to go along and pay its debts, or get behind and then have to pay an advanced price on everything it has to have to cover the discount and then have to pay interest on the increased amount. The same rule applies to public affairs as to private matters and should be so considered. Too much care cannot be exercised by those who lay the foundation for the finances of the county.
—It would be a good plan for the people to investigate the condition of the school, that they may be able to act intelligently when the time comes. There are enrolled forty pupils in the primary department, and thirty-eight in the grammar department. The attendance in both rooms has been very regular, so that both rooms have been crowded. Such conditions are not just to either teachers or pupils. In the primary department it is necessary to put three in a seat, and any one knows that is too crowded. The ventilation is poor, the floor is worn out, the plastering coming off, and the lighting of the rooms is such that the eyes of some of the children are said to be affected. It is some time yet before the annual school meeting, so that all have time to make up their minds as to what they consider the best thing to do.

The commissioners met yesterday. Their proceedings will be published next week.
On Monday the writer paid a short visit to the home of Peter Schaefer, near Bodare. He has about two hundred acres under ditch and one of the best equipped places in the county. The man who has had which he can irrigate is in great luck.
The flues of the boiler at the pump house got sprung last week so that it leaked to such an extent that it would not hold. A flue expander was necessary and none is owned here. The village authorities took the matter up with the railroad people at Chadron and by the courtesy of Supt. Harris the use of an expander was obtained and the repairs made and the pump started before the supply of water on hand was exhausted.
