The State Convention.

The republican state convention at Lincoln last week named the ticket which appears at the head of our columus. Five ballots were necessary to decide on the man for governor, the first ballot pominated the lieutenant governor, Secretary of State Piper was renomnated by acclamation and then came a bot fight for auditor. On the first ballot Eckles had 162 votes, on the second, 97, and on the third 7. For treasurer it took three ballots to decide on Casey. Jewett receiving 116 on the first and 128 on the second, and 34 on the third. For superintendent Corbett received 994 on the first ballot out of 1057. Attorney General Churchill received all but 174 votes on the first ballot. Land Com missioner Russell only had 155 votes against him. For supreme judges Robert Ryan was nominated on the first ballot for the long term and on the third ballot Judge Kinkaid was nominated for the short term. Whitmore was nominated for regent on the first ballot. The eight presidential electors were named without incident and the ticket was

R. W. Montgomery, of Alliance, was selected for member of the state central committee for this district, and the se lection was a good one. He is a man of experience, standing and ability, and has demonstrated that he is a good organizer and good work will be done by him to redeem this part of the state from the political blight which has rested upon it for the past six years. It is is hoped b E BREWSTER that he will be given a place on the executive committee, as that would help him in the work.

While the northwest did not secure a place on the ticket, the nomination of MacColl for governor was certainly a concession to the western part of the state, as he is generally considered as being a western.

Eckles had a good vote on the start but he could not hold his strength, and it is evident that the nomination of Mac-Coll caused some to feel that the west should be satisfied with that and cast their votes for others than Eckles.
