Hon. F. M. Harrington is to speak in Harrison on October 6th. He has the reputation of being one of the best popular orators in the northern part of the state.

Mrs. P. N. Kirkpatrick brought in a radish a few days ago which weighed six pounds after the top had been trimmed off close. It grew on high table land, without irrigation.

John S. Tucker was up from White river Friday, renewing his acquaintance with Jack MacJoll, whom he knew many years ago. The talk over old times was enjoyed by both.

The race between the Earnest and Turner horses on Monday was witnessed by quite a crowd, and resulted in a victory for the animal belonging to the former. Considerable money is said to have changed hands.

The result of the hearing of the case of the state against Harry Brown was that the defendant was held to appear at the district court, and Judge Wilson fixed his bond at \$500.00. Sheriff Bartlett took a poll of the voters on the Elkhorn train east of Long Pine while on his return from the eastern part of the state, with the result of twenty-five expressing themselves for McKinley and five for Bryan. He says that appears to be about the proportion all over the state from what he saw and heard.

In this issue appears the list of real estate on which taxes are delinquent for the year 1895. According to a late decision of the supreme court the advertised list must contain all of the delinquent taxes and as a result the treasurer has had a large amount of extra work to do to prepare it, but he got it out on time.

William Belden who formerly lived here was reported to have been found in the sand hills in an insensible condition a few days ago. He had been there in that condition for about three days, having been thrown from his horse and striking on his head with such force as to produce concussion of the brain. It is quite likely that death has resulted before this time.

It is to be regretted that it rained on last Friday, thus preventing many from getting out to the republican meeting. As it was a fair audience, mostly republicans, greeted the speakers. MacJoll was first introduced and occupied but a few moments, and he was followed by Senator Tefft. The latter simply spoke of the encouraging outlook for republican success in both national and state matters. Cady was then introduced and he made a talk which was conceded as the best ever made in Harrison. He did not attempt to display his power of oratory; he did not attempt to abuse or belittle those who differed from him; he did not attempt to apply the party lash, but for nearly two hours he talked to his audience in a plain, straightforward, business way, presenting the position of the republican party on the national issues of the day. His discussion of the tariff demonstrated beyond question that the change in the national policy on the tariff question was more conducive to the existing hard times than anything else. His discussion of the financial issue was plain, and being a practical, active business man he spoke from that standpoint. If Mr. Cady makes as good an impression in other places as here there is no doubt as to his election. No populist or democrat could take offense at his remarks, no matter how much they differed from him in conclusions.
