Articles of Incorporation of the Stock Men's Townsite Company. BE IT KNOWN, That the undersigned with the intention of associating themselves together and forming a corporation for the purposes hereinafter set forth under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Nebraska, have adopted and do hereby adopt Articles of Incorporation as follows:

ARTICLE I. The name of this Corporation shall be: Stock Men's Townsite Company, and its principal place of transacting business shall be at Andrews, in Sioux county, Nebraska.

ARTICLE II. The general nature of the business of this Corporation shall be to acquire, sell and deal in lands in the State of Nebraska, and in other States where it may lawfully transact such business. To promote the settlement and occupation of such lands as it may acquire by purchase, or otherwise; To lay out and plat the same into town lots, streets, alleys and public grounds, and to sell or otherwise dispose of such lands or lots, and for this purpose shall be vested with full power to make contracts with individuals or corporations for the purchase or sale of real or personal property and to do all acts and things necessary or proper to be done to carry out and fully execute the business of this Corporation, to have a common or corporate seal which it may alter or change at pleasure, to sue and be sued, to make such by laws as it may deem expedient, not inconsistent with law.

ARTICLE III. The Capital stock of this Corporation shall be Three Thousand Dollars, which shall be divided into shares of Twenty Five Dollars each, of which Twenty seven per cent shall be paid at the time of subscribing and the remainder when called for by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV. The time of the commencement of this Corporation shall be on the Third day of April, A. D. 1897, and of the termination on the Third day of April, A. D. 1907.

ARTICLE V. The affairs of this Corporation shall be conducted by a Board of Seven Directors, who shall be elected annually by the Stock holders at such time and place as the By laws of the company may determine, and they shall hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified. The following named persons shall compose the first Board of Directors, and they shall hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified, viz: J. W. Earnest, Andrew Meadley, Robert F. Messer, Isaac Riesenstein, N. Douglas Hamlin, James F. Bourret, H. H. Russel.

The officers of this Corporation shall be a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and such other officers as the Board of Directors shall deem advisable, and they shall hold their offices during the pleasure of said Board.

ARTICLE VI. The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which this Corporation is at any time to subject itself is Two Thousand Dollars.

ARTICLE VII. These Articles of Incorporation may be altered or amended by the Board of Directors, provided that a majority of said Board vote for such amendment.

ARTICLE VIII. The private property of Stock holders shall be exempt from the Corporation debts. In testimony whereof we have hereunto set our hands this Tenth day of March, A. D. 1897.
