If the statements are true as made by official records and published in the World-Herald, in regard to the character of the republican candidate Mr. Moores, we can't see how people, who's financial interests are at stake could vote for him and have a clear conscience afterwards.

Last Tuesday the 13th, inst was the day set apart by Hon. Chauncey F. Black, the president of the National Association of Democratic clubs, also by Hon. James K. Jones, chairman of the Democratic National Committee as the day to celebrate the birth of Thomas Jefferson, the founder of American Democracy and the author of the declaration of independence.

The forth coming jubilee celebration promises to be a most important event. April 22 (Arbor day) was fixed upon as a suitable time for the people of Omaha and vicinity to mark the beginning of active work upon the Exposition. An elaborate program has been arranged. A monster parade will comprise all of the military and civic societies in this vicinity, invitations having been sent out during the past week by the special committee. City and county officials will be invited to Farnam streets, and will march east on Farnam to Twelfth street, north to Douglas, west to Sixteenth and north on Sixteenth to the Exposition grounds. The oratorical portion of the exercises will take place in the old grand stand on the fair grounds. Invitations to speak have been extended to Governor Holcomb of Nebraska, Governor Drake of Iowa, Hon. W. J. Bryan, Hon. J. Sterling Morton, Hon. John Baldwin of Council Bluffs and Mayor Broatch of Omaha.

The 25th session of the legislature of Nebraska is a matter of history and a careful inspection of the laws passed proves that the reform forces redeemed their pledges to the people. They passed sound, equitable and just anti-monopoly measures providing for the control and regulation of the affairs of corporations, combines and trusts. Besides passing wholesome laws they unearched defalcations, amounting to near \$800,000. Next week THE JOURNAL will give its readers a synopsis of the new laws.

Republican newspapers charged the fusionists with attempting to steal the constitution because they asked for a recount of the ballots providing for two new judges. Why did they take such an interest in the matter? Why did the Lincoln gang instruct their satellites to cry fraud? Why did they get a partisan judge to enjoin the legislature from counting the votes? ### Arbor Day Proclamation.

Executive Chamber, Lincoln, Neb.  
March 29th, 1897.  
Proclamation by the Governor:  
Conforming to a law enacted, having its inception in Nebraska and now grown national in its character, and to the end

that the attention of the people of our beautiful state may be called to the advantages to be gained by a proper observance of the day, I hereby proclaim and designate Thursday, April 22, 1897, as Arbor day.

I earnestly request all citizens to fully comply with the spirit of the law in making this a public holiday, and especially do I commend to the public schools the propriety of an observance of the day by suitable exercises and practicable lessons in tree planting, in order that there may be inculcated in the minds of the children of the state a high appreciation of the pleasures, enjoyment and utility, to the present and future generations, of tree planting and timber preservation.

On that day let us not forget that "Who sows a field or trains a flower, Or plants a tree is more than all. For he who blesses most is blest; And God and man shall own his worth, Who toils to leave at his behest And add beauty to the earth. In testimony whereof, I have hereunto subscribed my name and caused to be affixed the great seal of the state of Nebraska.

Done at Lincoln, the capital of the state, this 29th day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, of the state, the thirty-fifth, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and twenty-first.
