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GIVES CUBANS HOPE.

Senate Passes Resolution Recognizing Their Belligerency

MAJORITY IS LARGE.

Forty-one Senators Favor the Measure, Fourteen Oppose.

MAY BE HELD IN THE HOUSE.

Believed Its Adoption There Would Embarrass President.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 20.—Special Telegram.—The Senate today passed the resolution recognizing the belligerency of the Cuban insurgents by a vote of 41 to 14 as follows:

When the presiding officer announced the passage of the resolution the pent-up feeling of the spectators found expression in a noisy and long-continued demonstration.

Mr. Chandler, who was in the chair, pounded his gavel, and Mr. Hawley, springing to his feet, exclaimed:

"I protest against the mob!"

A moment later the Senate went into executive session, and at 5:40 p. m. adjourned until Monday.

The voting occurred after an exciting debate, participated in by Senators Thurston (Neb.), Elkins (W. Va.), White (Cal.), Fairbanks (Ind.), Hale (Me.), Spooner (Wis.) and Gorman (Md.). Mr. Thurston, who presided over the Republican national convention at St. Louis, recalled the stirring scene when that convention enthusiastically inserted a Cuban plank in the platform, and declared that this resolution was in partial fulfillment of that pledge.

Messrs. Elkins and White urged a conservative course and an inquiry by a committee. Then came the first vote—that on the Hale motion to refer. It was a test of strength, and the defeat of the motion assured the passage of the resolution. Mr. Fairbanks tried to stem the tide by offering a compromise proposition, somewhat on the lines of the Cuban plan adopted at St. Louis, but it met the same fate as the Hale motion.

Just before the final vote was taken Mr. Hale, who has been the reorganized leader of the opposition to the resolution, arose for a last word of protest. He spoke with intense earnestness in his tones. In the votes just taken, he said the foreign policy of this administration had been dictated by those in opposition to it.

"I believe," continued Mr. Hale, "that the passage of this resolution involves the United States possibly, and I fear probably, in war in the near future."

SILVER MEN DINE.

Free Coinage Leaders Enjoy the Hospitality of Congressman Newlands.

The dinner developed into a conference relating to methods resisting the efforts of the gold Democrats to dominate the party and all the silver Democrats present declared in unmistakable terms that this result was impossible and that there would be neither compromise nor surrender. The silver Republicans and Populists who were present announced absolutely the loyalty of their parties to the Democracy while it remained true to the Chicago platform and under its present leadership. Representatives Shafer and Bell were both present at the dinner.

TELLER SAYS IT IS USELESS.

Morgan Resolution Will Surely Be Turned Down in the House.

Denver, Colo., May 21.—"Spain cannot drive this country into war," said Senator Teller today in discussing the action of the senate in passing the Morgan resolution directing the president to declare that a state of war exists in Cuba. "This administration is too cowardly to do anything. It is afraid of offending Spain. The passage of that resolution does not mean anything at all except that the president cannot control the senate as he does the house. It will be defeated as sure as it gets there."

"Reed will say it shall not pass, the president will say it shall not pass, Hanna will say it shall not pass and the trucking republicans in the house will yield. It does not matter at all what the private opinions of the members be. It is evident that the administration is entering on a foreign policy as contemptible and pusillanimous as that of Cleveland's was. It is a shame, but there is no help for it. The people can only speak through their representatives and they are dominated absolutely by the administration. I cannot conceive of any public demonstrations vigorous enough to have any effect on the president's policy."

The trotting races occur on June 8, 9, 10 and 11.

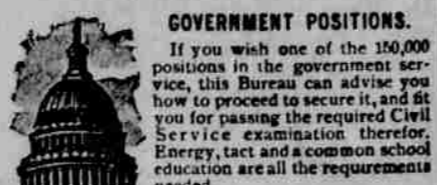
The great pacing horse JOHNNY, record 2:12, will each day attempt to lower his own record, going without driver or harness.
