Silver Campaign in Nebraska.

Democrats Will Call on all Silver Organizations in Nebraska to Line Up for the Fall Fight.

LINCOLN, Neb., June 27.—The Silver Democratic state central committee will meet here to-morrow to arrange an early date for the state convention. At the same time they will issue a card to the central committee of the Populists and silver Republicans, requesting those two parties call their state conventions at the same time and place as the Silver Democratic convention.

This will be the first move towards opening the fall campaign. There are to be a supreme court judge and two state regents elected, but the real importance of the election grows out of the fact that Bryan will take the stump in the state and hold it in line for silver.

His failure to be so very active, having maintained their county political organizations need to such good advantage in this state last year. Bryan's personal friends declare that he has assurances from leaders in different parts of the state that they can hold it with an increased majority over last spring.

Clark To Quit Wyoming Senator to Leave The Fold.

Time for Re-Election is Near and He Sees an Avalanche for Silver Starting.

Democrats to Extend Aid in the Re-Election of Senator Cannon in Utah-Teller to be Front-runner in Fight for Lower Lumber Duties.

WASHINGTON, D. C., 26.—Senator Clark of Wyoming, is the latest to be mentioned as likely to abandon the gold Republican party and unite with other silver men of the various parties in the effort for the restoration of the white metal. The report concerning Clark appears to be based on more substantial grounds than that relating to Carter and Shoup. He is known to have spoken to several prominent Silver Republicans in distinct derogation of the Republican policy toward silver.

Two weeks ago he was equally disgruntled with the attitude of the party on the tariff. But his feelings on that subject have been slightly improved by the increased wool duties and the cautious decision regarding hides. There are personal reasons also for the Clark defection that do not exist in the case of either of the others.

HE TALKS ABOUT EXPIRING.

Senator Clark's re-election will be pending before the people next year. No doubt is expressed by any of the Western men that the next election can have but one result in Wyoming, and that will be the overwhelming silver victory, that will close the career of Mr. Clark if he remains a gold Republican.

AID FOR CANNON.

Several leading Silver Republicans including ex-Senator Dubois this week waited on Senator Jones and urged that every effort be made by Democrats to aid in the re-election of Cannon of Utah. The Silver Republicans are greatly interested in Cannon. They have informed the Silver Democrats of their desire to have him re-elected, and are anxious to know that they can depend on Democratic help in the Cannon campaign. Senator Jones told them he would be pleased to see Cannon re-elected. The Silver Republicans told the Senator that Cannon's failure to be re-elected following that of Dubois, would have a very depressing effect on Silver Republicans throughout the nation.

LOWER DUTY ON LUMBER.

One more effort is to be made to secure the adoption of an amendment to the lumber tariff by lowering the duty to \$1 per thousand and Senator Teller will be prominent in the movement. He will be assisted by a number of Western senators who believe this duty to be oppressive and in fact in-excusable. Even from the lumber states of Middle West there comes formidable opposition to the duty of \$2, to which the senate and house have each tentatively agreed. Among the opponents of the established duty are Secretary of War Alger, and Senator McMillan, both coming from a great lumber state. They are said to be large holders of Canadian stumpage. However that may be, they are now known to be strong opponents of the high duty and can be safely relied on to do everything that remains possible to defeat the obnoxious high duty.
