The Law For Women.

To those only who have given the subject little thought, will the desirability of the study of political science by women be a mooted question. The relation of the law to the home is very intricate, and as such is certainly a proper subject of investigation by every woman.

This is desirable, first for general culture and information, legal culture and phraseology are common in our current literature, in the sermons we hear and in lectures.

It is not more than eight years, since a woman had any legal right to her own children in the state of New York.

If the husband for any reason, chose to will the child away from her, he could do so and there was no law to protect her. Wherever the old law is still untouched by statute, the same condition still prevails.

Women own and pay taxes on much of the property in our land; it would indeed be interesting to know how many fortunes have melted away, because of the ignorance of their owners.

The foes we fight are the enemies of the home, the church, of society, and good government. Our battlefield, whatever it once was is now and will be in the future, the political arena. We plead for greater intelligence along these lines, and urge upon every woman early attention to these vitally important subjects.

How Womanhood is Honored.

In no country are women so highly respected or treated so courteously as in America. A lady can travel anywhere without an escort, and hear no disrespectful language or sneers and she can feel assured that should an emergency arise she would be accorded the amplest protection.

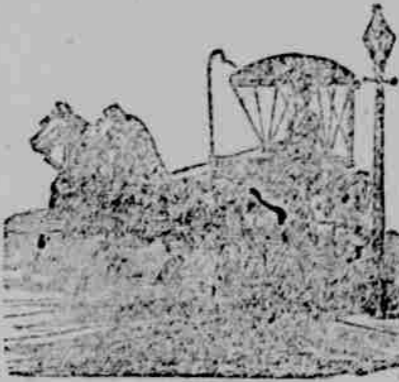
