The great coal miners strike is an indication of returning prosperity.

The new tariff law provides for the manufacturers as against the laborer and consumer.

Already sugar has gone up a cent per pound as a result of the new tariff law; but no increase in the volume of money. How do you like your prosperity?

Right on the heels of the announcement of the Dingley bill becoming a law, a great trust has been formed in New York city to the extent of \$40,000,000 which will control the entire out-put of glucose in the United States.

Prof. Andrews, president of Brown university, Rhode Island, has been forced to resign his position as head of that historic seat of learning simply on account of having ideas of his own. His free silver proclivities were a constant menace to corporate greed and rule by which the university is controlled. It is plain to be seen that one must be subservient to the money barons or be fired bodily from their presence no matter what business they may be engaged in. It is a pity there isn't more such men as Prof. Andrews. He had the courage of his convictions and rather than stultify them he gracefully resigned.

The Dingley tariff bill has passed the two houses of congress, signed by the president and went into effect July 23rd, at midnight. Hence, the republican party has carried out its pledge of taxing the people to make them prosperous and well-to-do. The next thing for the g. o. p. to do, will be the retreating of the greenbacks and treasury notes - which president McKinley stands pledged, and for reference read his inaugural address endorsing the Indianapolis monetary convention - and substitute instead National bank notes. When that time comes, and it will come, if in the power of the g. o. p. party, then the dear loving people can rustle and get a living if they can.

Senator Burrows of Michigan defended the lumber schedule on the ground that an industry that employed 600,000 people and paid \$130,000,000 annually in wages was worth protecting. Those are interesting figures. They show that the lumber trust pays the enormous wages of 69 1/3 cents per day. And these figures must be very liberal, for they were quoted by Senator Burrows of Michigan, who knows all about the lumber trust. A fraction less than 70 cents a day is good wages in the opinion of Senator Burrows who draws \$16 a day the year round. Sundays included - with perquisites that will make it 20 per cent more. Of course a trust that pays such enormous wages as 69 cents a day is deserving of the fostering care of the general government. - World-Herald.

Lead This Lincoln Dispatch.

LINCOLN, Neb., July 18, 1897. - (Special Correspondence.) - The republican press has opened the campaign this year before a nomination has been made or a platform adopted with malicious assaults on the management of almost every institution and every reform official in the state. The Nebraska Hansacre started out with the charge that Governor Holcomb was in league with Bartley and Moore in all their defalcations, and they have kept it up all along the line. They said that the manager of the reform school at Kearney had leased out all the farming lands belonging to that institution pocketed the proceeds and would keep the boys in idleness. Aided by traitors within the populist fold they have charged malfeasance in office against the governor, the auditor, the secretary of state, the superintendent of reform school and blind asylum. And I don't know how many more. I fancy the "old guard" will not be fooled by these tactics involving for more Bartleys and Moors ten cent corn. The men who voted the reform ticket last fall will vote it again this fall and a great many more besides.

In regard to union of forces in the next fight, I believe after having talked with members of the "old guard" from nearly all parts of the state, that they feel as follows on that subject.

We don't want any affiliation with that sort of Democrats who have run that party for the last twenty years - men like Gordon, Brice, Whitney Linsey, Voorhees, Catchins, Ransom, Boie, and all their tribe. We believe in Bryan, and with men like him we can associate. We know that the gold power, the trusts, the railroads and every organization of greed in this land have agents in nearly every township in the United States working to get control of the Democratic party. Now if the Democrats of the Bryan stripe will stand up and fight the trusts and railroads as the populists have fought down them and drive them out, we will gladly welcome them as allies and friends.

As to the silver republicans, they make no separate nominations and ask for no offices. On the money question their great leader, Senator Teller, takes the same position as the populists. He has declared on the floor of the senate time and time again that money is a creation of law, and therefore all money is fiat money.

The republican press is greatly distressed about the expense of the last legislature, but especially sorrowful are they over the amount paid to the senate employees. The official records of the state house show that the employees of the senate for the session of 1895 received \$31,237.50. For the session of 1897 they received \$20,457.50 and the session was three days longer. So the employes received \$790 less in 1897 although they worked three days longer than they did in 1895.

The secretaries of the senate and house always received pay for more days than the legislature is in session in every state in the union for the reason that in handling all the bills, resolutions and other business, their work only really begins when the house and senate adjourn, and they are hard at work all the time when the house adjourns for two or three days at a time.

The Lincoln daily papers have been filling their columns with slanders of reform officials for the last two weeks and the republican country weeklies reprint them. But the old guard has had some experience of the same sort with those papers in the last six years which is not forgotten. They can't fool us that way. The trick is too old. We are not going to be deceived by the Mosher-Dorgan-Moore-Bartley-State Journal gang. We know em'.
