W. J. BRYAN WILL BE IN CHADRON ON Thursday, Aug. 26. Chadron is Making Great Preparations for the Occasion-Every Body in Sioux County Should go.

OLD OFFICIALS OUT. Provisions of the New Act Show Some Material Changes--Voters Attention Called to Alterations.

The attorney general has given his opinion that the old election officers will not hold over, but that they were legislated out of office by the new act and the county judges must appoint new precinct judges and clerks who will conduct the election for the next year.

The act provides that these officers of election shall be of good character well informed, who can read and write and speak the English language, and that they shall have resided in the election precinct for which they are appointed to serve for at least one year next preceding appointment and shall be entitled to vote therein.

RULES OF ELECTION. The county judge shall appoint as Judges and Clerks of election at least ten days before the election three judges and two clerks, nominated for such offices in precinct primaries, and the county judge shall elect for each precinct one judge of election from the party polling the highest number of votes at the last general election in the precinct and one judge from the party polling the next highest number of votes at the last general election and one judge from the party polling the next highest number of votes at the last general election.

DUTY OF PRIMARIES. The duty of the precinct primaries of selection is left to the county judge without restriction. The old plan of having electors present at the polls name officers to fill vacancies is still operative where none of the regularly appointed officers show up at the time for opening the polls.
