Fusion State Ticket.

Have you noticed the fusion state ticket, at the head of our editorial column.

The dreaded scourge yellow fever has again made its appearance in the south spreading desolation and death everywhere in its wake. At first physicians thought it was break-bone fever, but a close investigation disclosed the fact that it was no other than the dreaded "yellow jack".

It would seem as if the last straw had been placed on the camel's back in order to break it. A circuit Judge in Wheeling, W. Va., on the 3rd inst. issued an injunction restraining Rev. W. H. Wiley, a Methodist minister from holding revival meetings or prayer meetings among the coal miners near that place who have been out on strike for the past two months. "Government by injunction" is getting to be more popular every day with the money lords, coal barons and a purchasable court. It is coming to a pretty past when a minister representing the meek and lowly Nazarene must be enjoined from doing good among his fellowmen. "What will the harvest bring fourth? We are making rapid strides toward that point in the history of the United States—if the people do not by the ballot bring about a change in our political government—and it isn't too late already—when there will be just two classes in this glorious free republic of ours; the very rich and the very poor, when the poor will stand at a ratio of about 99 poor ones or more to one rich person. Are the people perpetuating a free Government? or, are we passing into serfdom which is it? The laboring class which are the wealth producing people ought to study the economic questions and learn where we are traveling to.

First Months Receipts of the Dingley Tariff Bill.

Receipts of the revenue derived from the Dingley tariff law during the first month of its operation shows a deficit of \$4,000,000, greater than the deficit for the same month August in 1896, under the Wilson law. The report is as follows:

The customs item leads with a reduction of \$5,341,793. In other words, the Dingley law produced less revenue from customs in August, 1897, than the Wilson law did in August, 1896, the difference in favor of the Wilson law being \$5,341,793. When compared with August, 1895, the failure of the Dingley law as a producer of revenue is more plainly seen. The deficit under the Wilson law in 1895 was \$3,635,489. The deficit under the Dingley law in August, 1897, is \$14,851,793. Some allowances should be made for the natural falling off in customs receipts owing to the prepaying of duties to escape the higher rates of the Dingley law, but even this will not account for the great deficit in August. The first report under the Dingley law is a disappointment to its supporters. It will also prove the contention that the first object of the Dingley law was to reimburse the trusts and syndicates for the contributions made to the republican campaign fund the question of being being secondary. —World Herald.

ENJOINS EVEN PRAYING.

Judge Hagans of Wheeling Includes a Minister in an Injunction.

Wheeling, W. Va., Sept. 3.—Another injunction was served this morning on J. W. Ren, James Wood and seventy-three others named, and an unlimited number of unnamed and unknown people, prohibiting them from holding meetings or marching near the property of the Washington Coal and Coke company.

This injunction was issued by Judge J. H. Hagans, the regular judge of the Marion county circuit court. Among those named in the instrument is Rev. W. H. Wiley, who has been holding religious services in the strikers' camps Sundays and prayer meetings through the week. He has never failed to pray for the operators and Governor Fleming at any of these services. Wiley is the regular pastor of the Methodist church. —World Herald.
