The Winning Ticket.

The candidates on the fusion county ticket with the exception of Miss Elsie Merriman for Superintendent of schools, and Thomas Holly for sheriff will need no introduction to the voters of our county.

M. J. Blewett who heads the ticket for county clerk and who is the present incumbent is a competent efficient and honest officer and for proof of this statement any body who cares to take the trouble to inform themselves can call at Clerk Blewett's office and make a personal examination of his books or Mr. Blewett will take special pains to show them.

Charles Biehle who is a candidate for Treasurer and, like Clerk Blewett is the present county treasurer. Charles Biehle has probably been one of the best county treasurers Sioux county has ever had the good fortune to possess; he has collected taxes that none of his predecessors could get—whether they tried or not we do not know—but at any rate the man who can collect the taxes, everything else being equal is just what we want and that is Charles Biehle whom we know to be honest competent and in every way fitted for the position.

Thomas Holly the nominee for sheriff of Sioux county is a resident of Badore precinct, is about 40 years of age and in the prime of life; he is an old resident of the county and is a man well qualified to fill the office of sheriff and in our opinion when he goes after a criminal, will bring him in dead or alive if such a thing can be done. If the voters of our county want a man that will do his duty under all circumstances give Thomas Holly a good hearty vote on November 2nd.

In behalf of Hon. Judge Wilson, our present county Judge, it would not be out of place to say that he has no doubt been one of the very best county Judges this county has ever had. He has filled the office for the past two years with credit to himself and to the people he serves. He is honest, upright and competent and we believe his decisions on points of law in cases brought before his Honor for adjudication have always been fair and impartial. He has made as little expense for the county as possible. Judge Wilson has read law with Judge James Pollack of Paxton, Ill., and Judge Lewis of Hutchinson, Minn., besides reading law here. Judge Wilson adds dignity and honor to the office and we believe no better candidate could have been found in the county for the place. He has been tried and not found wanting. He is gentlemanly, courteous and obliging at all times and he is the right man in the right place.

B. F. Thomas nominated for the office of county surveyor is we believe as well qualified for the position as any man in the state of Nebraska; he is the present county Surveyor and does work in his line both in Wyoming and S. Dakota which speaks for his ability as a competent surveyor. No honest man was ever induced into office in the county than we believe Hon. B. F. Thomas to be we expect to see him re-elected to the

office by a large majority.

As county coroner Dr. Julian E. Primney who was nominated by the fusion forces Sept. 25th, will in our opinion be elected without opposition and he ought to be. It is true there has not so far been another candidate put into the field against him, but even if there was no more competent person in the county could be found to perform the duties that devolve upon the county coroner than Dr. Primney.

Miss Elsie Merriman who was the choice of the Peoples Independent Party convention and endorsed by the Democratic convention for county superintendent of Public Instruction is a result of Warborn precinct and so far as we are able to learn has the ability and qualifications to administer the duties of the office of superintendent if elected as we believe she will be. We believe the nomination of Miss Merriman was an honor well bestowed and one we know is highly appreciated by her and we believe the voters ought to rally to her support.

Make no Mistake.

There is one thing we desire to impress on the minds of the voters of the 3rd commissioners dist. this is, that commissioner Young ought by all means to be elected this fall, in being the only member of the old guard who has been nominated to fill the office again the other two, one has resigned, and the term of the other has expired, hence it looks as if it would be wrong to put three new men in the office who will have no knowledge of how the county affairs are run.

We do not mean to say that the other candidates are not all of them good men or, that they are not qualified even if any one of the other candidates should be elected, but because commissioner Young has had a year's experience or nearly so to assist him in the discharge of the duties of the office if elected. Mr. Young is honest, conscientious, careful and competent to fill the office. He is a graduate of an English college and has been a resident of this country for over sixteen years. We are quite sure no mistake will be made if Mr. Young is elected in November.

NOTICE.

Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of Sioux County Nebraska, that by an act of the last legislature, the judges and clerks of election in the county are to be appointed by the county judge, and that such election officers will be appointed from those who may be nominated by precinct caucuses of the several parties, provided that the certificates of nomination are filed in my office on or before the 22nd day of October; each precinct party caucus should name three persons for judges and two for clerks of election.

From the nominees certified to me I shall be required by law to make the appointments on the 23rd of October; and if any party in any precinct shall fail to hold its caucus and certify its nomination, within the time specified, I shall thereafter make such appointments as shall upon impartial information seem to me most suitable, and in conformity with the law.

In precincts which have not already made nominations the caucuses should be held without delay, to insure time for the caucus officers to return the certificates for filing by October 22.

No persons are eligible as election officers who are not of good character approved integrity and well informed; or who cannot read, write and speak the English language, or have not resided in the election precinct in which they are to serve next preceding their appointment or are not entitled to vote therein, or are candidates to be voted for at the election to be held November 2nd 1897 or who have anything bet or wagered on the result of such election.
