Corbett, who was appointed U. S. senator from Oregon by the governor a year ago to succeed Mitchell, the retiring senator on account of the legislature failing to elect, has been refused his seat in that august body by a vote of 50 to 10.

The administration, of course, will want to submit for arbitration the assassination of the 253 sailors and the blowing up of our battleship Maine in the Havana harbor, like it did the money question soon after it came into power, to foreign powers probably with about as much consideration for the rights of the American people. The crowned heads of Europe stand together, the stealing of Chinese territory is proof of it.

Russell Sage one of the Wall Street millionaires is the only capitalist who has had American patriotism enough to rise up and declare that this government should not hesitate to chastise Spain severely for the blowing up of the battleship Maine. He is one of the gold men who believed last fall that the honor and integrity of this country ought to be maintained by adhering to the gold standard. He, evidently has the courage of his convictions and should it engage his government should it engage in war with Spain.

The bondsmen of ex-state treasurer Bartley have been released from having to make good Bartley's shortages during his term of office, as a result of a long fought legal battle just concluded last week. The bondsmen, it would seem to us should have been released long ago, when the supreme court will turn a original lease for embezzlement of twenty or thirty thousand dollars, because they can, as they claim, find no law to punish him, Bartley should, by all means be liberated as he certainly has been "unjustly" incarcerated. War Bulletin.

A Daily Digest of Spanish War News Commencing Monday, Feb. 28th.

The battleship Maine blown up by Spanish merchants. Three wretches bribed agents to destroy the United States battleship—Slaughter of Americans deliberately planned—Eckers clue.

Secretary of the navy appeals to congress for an auxiliary fleet and more Marines. Gravity of the situation emphasized by unusual exertion made to get all vessels in fighting trim.

Belief generally entertained that Spain will never consent to paying any indemnity to United States for the maine disaster.

PREMIER SAGASTA

Says Spain admits no alien intrusions or interventions in her own affairs. "We will tolerate nothing that may mean intervention, however indirect."

Tuesday March 1st.
\$20,000,000, for a better navy, that is what Representative Bromwell proposes in the house today.

Appropriation is to buy new ships and to arm and equip them properly. Object is to gain footing "for immediate hostilities with any foreign power."

Will the Maine board return?
Navy department knows not whether more sessions be held at Havana. Issuance of death certificates to the heirs of the dead sailors being conducted.

Bodies heretofore recovered will be taken to Key west, where they will be given temporary interment.

Wednesday, March 2nd.
The American battle ships at Key West and dry Tortugas, are ordered to be ready at the tap of the drum for immediate action. Secretary of war, Long, instructs Rear Admiral Sicard to prepare his mighty squadron for a quick trip to Cuba.

Spaniards' launt boasts of sinking the battleship Maine. Washington authorities impressed with the idea of an uprising in Havana by the Spaniards, against the Americans, residents there.

Spaniards grow bolder in Havana and an outbreak is expected when battleship Vizcaya arrives at that Port. Every thing at this time looks very serious and will no doubt result in war sooner or later.

Thursday March 3rd.
Spain will not be implicated. The board of inquiry is expected to return verdict without fixing the guilt. Spaniards will nevertheless be held to account for the blowing up of the Maine. Delay countries to be the policy of the administration with suppression of the facts.

In the opinion of the JOURNAL there will be no war with Spain. Watch the future, it will bear us out, whether right or wrong.
