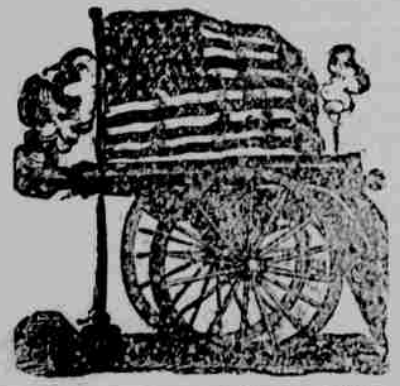

The Journal stands fairly and squarely on the Chicago platform, but will not hesitate to support and work for the election of candidates for the various offices to be voted for this fall no matter whether they are Democrats, Populist or free silver Republicans, if endorsed by all the reform parties, conditional, however, that they advocate bi-metallicism the income tax law, opposition to national banks of issue, are opposed to the retirement of the greenbacks and treasury notes, favor government control of railroads, telegraph and telephone lines and the establishment of postal savings banking system, and also are opposed to the issuing of national bonds in time of peace.



The report of the Maine investigation in Havana harbor was placed before the president and his cabinet on Tuesday. The report finds that the Maine was blown up externally and by Spanish authority. The cabinet's actions and deliberations resulted in six of the cabinet voting for war and the other two, secretaries Long and Gage, were opposed to war. Every indication points to war at this date.

Senator "Billy" Mason of Illinois who a few weeks ago, was working with might and main for Cuba's independence has been given to understand that Lombard street of London, Wall street and the administration will look after the island of Cuba and the Spanish bonds without any of his help. Congress has little to say on the subject any more.

Before the Pope of Rome concludes to arbitrate between the United States and Spain, he would do a better thing to christianize the bloody and treacherous Spaniards, then arbitration will not be necessary. If the boys in blue were given a chance arbitration would not be needed. But, then that would be called a jingo policy by the Gage style of statesmanship.

The Wyoming department of the Denver News is now edited by John Charles Thompson, vice Dr. A. A. Johnson who resigned. Dr. Johnson is to be editor in chief of the new Democratic weekly, which is to appear at Cheyenne about April 1st, and to secure the establishment of which \$1,200 were raised by Congressman Osborne and the local members of the party of Lammis county.—Wheatland World.
