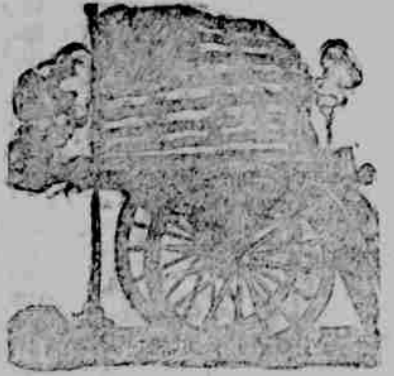

The JOURNAL stands fairly and squarely on the Chicago platform, but will not hesitate to support and work for the election of candidates for the various offices to be voted for this fall no matter whether they are Democrats, Populists or free silver Republicans, if endorsed by all the reform parties, conditional, however, that they advocate bimetallic in the income tax law, opposition to national banks of issue, are opposed to the retirement of the greenbacks and treasury notes, favor government control of railroads, telegraph and telephone lines and the establishment of postal savings banking system, and also are opposed to the issuing of national bonds in time of peace.

Everything now is war with Spain and the great duties of the nation are full of it.

Charles Emory Smith of Philadelphia has been appointed post-master general vice General Gary resigned.

Senator Edward C. Walthall of Mississippi, died in Washington, on the 21st inst. caused from typhoid pneumonia.

The Ohio legislature has found senator Hanna guilty of buying enough votes in that body to elect him to his present high office.

Pope Leo, has informed the Spanish government that they are committing suicide if it does not yield to the demands of the United States.

It is intimated by the metropolitan press that secretary of state, John Sherman and General Long secretary of the navy will soon retire from the Cabinet.

The president has issued a proclamation calling for 125,000 volunteers from the different states of the union apportioned according to the population of each state.

Hon. Chas. F. Manderson of Omaha has been slated for Major General of the army. No better man can be found anywhere than Mr. Manderson and there are lots of others in this state.

Barring other nations from taking hand the JOURNAL has ventured the opinion the war with Spain will be over in 90 days. Some people think it may last for a year or two. But of course then necessarily some international complications may arise to extend the war to a longer period.

Some six weeks ago the JOURNAL made the statement through its columns that there would be no war with Spain but we are frank to say we were mistaken notwithstanding all that, if president McKinley had his way it would have required another Maine incident to make him fight.

The ways and means committee of Congress have prepared a bill to increase the revenue of the government to \$120,000,000 a year. Of course it is more of a war measure than anything else. One of the most important features of the bill provides for placing a stamp tax on document papers which will provide 85 millions of the 120 million dollars which is expected the law will produce.

WAR NEWS.

A PROSPECT OF WAR.

As Indicated by the daily Press.

Last Saturday, report from Washington reached here that the U. S. Marines had captured a Spanish merchant vessel about 15 miles off from Havana; Sunday evening another special announced to the people of the United States that 5 more merchant vessels had been taken in and conducted to Key West for safe keeping. Report also reached here Monday evening that the queen regent and King of Spain had been forced to flee for their lives and that Spain was about to be declared a republic and grant freedom to Cuba. But the last paragraph lacks verification at this date. However within the next 48 hours there is liable to be startling news regarding the home government at Madrid.

Last Monday Congress formally declared war against Spain and hence forth we may expect fighting from now on until one or the other is whipped.

A special dispatch to Supt. Harris of the F. E. and M. V. railroad company at this place Tuesday night was to the effect that the U. S. naval vessel Mangrove had captured another Spanish transport bound for Cuban ports with 3,500 Spanish soldiers aboard. The name of the vessel could not be learned.

A report was current here the same evening that the Spanish fleet were heading for New York with the evident intention of bombarding that city; Also that there was an alliance between Great Britain and the United States.

Wednesday a report via Washington from London that Weyler and his followers had probably overthrown the Spanish government and was now in possession as it was most impossible to obtain any news from Madrid. The same report states that Russia and France have agreed together that if the first naval battle should go against the Spanish, the two nations will force Spain to yield to the demands of the United States.
