It has been intimated by the daily press of the country that there will likely be a third call for volunteer troops by President McKinley very shortly.

Senator Gorman of Maryland, has taken sides with the well-to-do bankers and the single gold standard men and is now advocating the issuing of bonds as a war measure. He is a Cleveland republican.

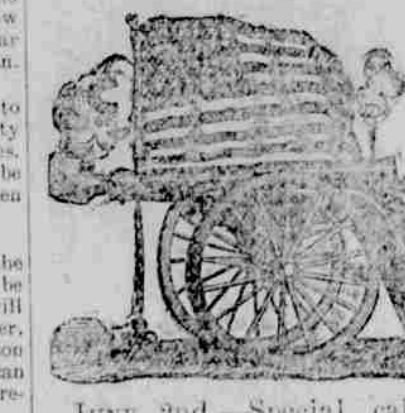
SHLEY and SAMPSON WHIPPED and CAPTURED CERVERA and His Fleet.



## WAR NEWS.

### A PROSPECT OF WAR.

As Indicated by the daily Press.



JUNE 2nd.—Special cable to the New York Journal, from Cape Haytien, report Commodore Schley destroyed the fleet of Cervera, and has reduced the fortifications of Santiago de cuba.

The losses sustained by the combatants are not stated. It is apparent the American navy has won another brilliant victory over the Spanish fleet and that without the loss of a single ship and doubtless without serious loss aboard ships.

JUNE 1st.—According to special dispatches to the metropolitan daily press the Oregon, New Orleans and New York have left Key West at full speed to reinforce Schley's squadron.

JUNE 1st.—Every indication points to a speedy close of the war according to a special dispatch to the New York Journal of May 30th: the president is already talking over the probable plans of peace which will take place between the United States and Spain very soon perhaps.

JUNE 2nd.—Over 20,000 people attended the Trans-Mississippi Exposition at Omaha yesterday, the opening day.

JUNE 1st.—Nearly 400 U. S. troops have been landed on Cuban soil.

Tuesday May 31.—Admiral Dewey says the Spanish shall not shoot the captives who surrendered to him without firing a shot.

JUNE 1st.—Sentiment in Europe has changed so suddenly in favor of the United States that our government may be embarrassed by the rush of rival powers for our good will.

Monday May 30.—Commodore Schley left the war department at Washington, declaring there was no doubt but Cervera was still in Santiago harbor.

MAY 31.—Without doubt Commodore Schley has Cervera's fleet bottled up at Santiago de Cuba and the indications are now that the decisive naval battle of the war will be fought soon.

Tuesday May 31.—Santiago de Cuba is to be attacked by land and sea. General Miles was ordered to send 25,000 troops there immediately after Santiago and Cervera's fleet is taken more troops will be sent to fortify the city.
