The war revenue bill passed the U. S. senate last Saturday with a majority of 20.

The JOURNAL is opposed to bonds in any form. A direct tax is preferable, in time of war or peace.

The above figures are no doubt true or approximately so hence, it is good reason why England should maintain the single gold standard and then seek to form an alliance with the United States, and thus help the national banking fraternity to foster and sustain the gold standard in this country. 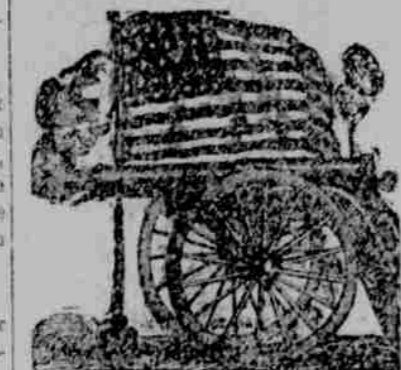
VICTORY Is Ours Again.

WAR NEWS.

A PROSPECT OF WAR.

JUNE 8.—It is reported the American fleet entered Santiago harbor reduced the forts and sunk two Spanish vessels. 5 thousands troops were then landed without much opposition.

JUNE 8.—The insurgents have been actively engaged in the Phillipine islands, killing many and taking prisoners 1,800 Spanish soldiers and fifty officers.

JUNE 8.—It is the intention of the administration soon as Porto Rico Phillipine islands and Cuba are subjugated to attack the cape verd and Canary islands possessions of Spain and then push on to Spain and lay siege to the mother country if they do not come to terms sooner.

JUNE 8.—Sampson has destroyed all Santiago forts and sunk one of the Dons first class cruisers, the Maria Teresa.
