Wheat fell 1 1/2 cents in Chicago last Tuesday.  
Joseph Leiter the Chicago wheat king is supposed to have went broke on last Monday not being able to put up the margins any longer.  
Germany seems to be determined to stick her nose into the affairs of this nation by ordering her entire Asiatic squadron to the Philippine islands.  
In the passing of the war revenue bill by congress on the 11th inst it means another step nearer imperialism and a more yed aristocracy in the United States.  
The first issue of national bonds will be \$200,000,000, and will be made a popular loan for 32 days, after that the national banks will take all that are left.

Spain it is said is willing to accept any terms for peace between that country and the United States provided however that it does not emanate direct from this country.  
In the voting of bonds by the United States congress to enslave the people of this country for several generations more, is only a verification of the Cleveland administration.  
Another large trust in this country to introduce itself to the people was consummated in New York city on the 10th inst. It includes distilleries in the United States outside of the American company. The consolidation represents \$24,000,000.  
The silver republican state committee of Colorado have wisely decided to unite with all the other silver forces of that state in the fall campaign. If the silver forces throughout the Union expect to accomplish anything for the double standard they should not fail to join hands against the gold standard party, the common enemy of the people.

Washington D. C., June 12.—Manila has surrendered, but the officials here are still without information as to whether it has surrendered to Admiral Dewey or to the insurgent forces.

Mole St. Nicholas Tuesday June 14.—Another battle was fought both by land and naval forces at Santiago or near by between the Spanish soldiery and 900 U. S. marines. Number of killed and wounded not given.

Washington D. C., June 15 The president contemplates making a third call for troops.

Washington, D. C. June 15.—It has been decided by the war department to assign Col. W. J. Bryan's Nebraska volunteers to the Philippine expedition to start soon.

Hanna Backing Barker For President.

CHICAGO, June 13.—Senator Marion Butler chairman of the Populist national committee passed through Chicago today to attend a meeting of the committee at Omaha.  
The senator says he had a tip that Mark Hanna has fixed up a deal with prominent Populists to hold a national convention next month at which Wharton Barker editor of the Philadelphia American is to be nominated for the presidency and resolutions passed against fusion with the Democrats, thus as Mr. Hanna supposes assuring the re-election of President McKinley. Senator Butler is confident however that the plan will fail.
