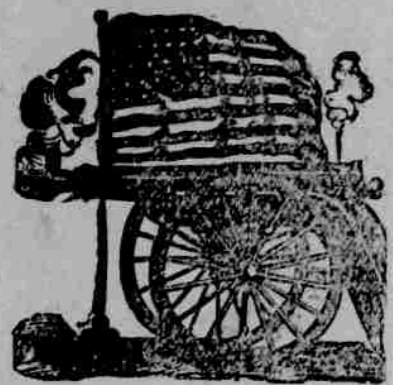

WHY DON'T YOU SUBSCRIBE FOR THE JOURNAL?

Indications are now that the gold congress, now in possession of a gold administration, will be routed, root and branch November 8th.

The French cabinet have decided to reopen the Capt. Dreyfus case which will doubtless result in the exiled prisoners acquittal.

According to an estimate made by the Democratic congressional campaign committee the result of the November election will show a majority in the next congress in favor of free silver of not less than 50. The different parties will elect about as follows:

The republican state convention of New York on the 27th inst nominated Hon. Theodore Roosevelt for governor on the first ballot. Tidy as he is better known by the press of the county was Colonel of a regiment of Rough Riders from the state of New York, and done valiant fighting at the battle of Santiago, Cuba.

Mr Annin, the State Journal's special correspondent at Washington is now engaged trying to besmirch the character and military record of Hon. W. J. Bryan by sending special dispatches to the Journal at Lincoln saying that the camp which is occupied by the 3rd Neb. volunteers is in worse condition than any camp at Jacksonville, where they are quartered.

Representative Bailey of Texas, declared in a speech in W. Virginia, last week that the surplus in the U. S. treasury above the gold reserve would exceed the bond issue, thus verifying his argument last May on the floor of congress that it was not necessary to issue bonds to carry on the war. Yet, a republican congress with the administration, insisted on the issuing of bonds for the national banks to draw interest from, and the wealth producing class will have it to pay.

It declares the senator went to Cleveland for the special purpose of holding a conference with Hon. M. A. Hanna, and to announce to that King of Kings and Lord of Lords his acceptance of republican principles. How can he look honest men in the face?

The Philadelphia Public Ledger has notified the Colorado republicans that they have been quibbling and, therefore, are deceptive, when they declare in their platform of resolutions, at their recent convention "that the republican party were in favor of International bi-metallicism." The Republic says the republican party are in favor of the single gold standard and that nothing else will work. No doubt the Republic voices the sentiment of the majority of that party.

The Following is a Sample.

Following are few cases of sick soldiers at Chickamauga camp showing how they were neglected and treated by incompetent officers and surgeons, who stationed at the above named place as shown by the investigating committee appointed by General Brackearidge. The short statements are clipped from the Omaha, World-Herald and as the few clippings will show there was not only incompetency shown on the part of those who were in charge of the sick, but brutality was a factor in the treatment of the soldier as these testimonies will show:

Captain C. H. Price of the Second Kentucky gave this evidence of brutality: "August 25, I was visiting members of my company in this hospital when my attention was directed to shrieks from the Ninth New York ward. I went there and discovered Major Hubbard attempting to administer medicine to a patient.

"I saw the surgeon take the patient by the shoulder and press him to the cot with great force. Then he caught the patient by the throat and held him down. After this he wrenched the patient's arm. I went into the tent and said to the surgeon: I don't know your name or rank, but this brutality must be stopped. The harsh treatment of the patient stopped, but the surgeon remarked that was the way to humor patients. The patient was delicious, which was the reason he would not take the medicine. This piece of brutality was seen by several other persons."

Lieutenant G. J. Hardy of the Ninth New York testified to these shameful facts: "I found Private Leibgold unconscious. He was laying nude and unwashed on a cot in the sun. His body was rolling from side to side and his eyes were glassy. Maggots were crawling on his body. It was a terrible and damnable piece of neglect."

Private Samuel L. Hinton of the First Mississippi said: "I volunteered to come over here to nurse members of my company. While in the typhoid fever ward I saw helpless patients laying covered with flies with no one to help them. I remember a man from the Ninth New York in ward C. He was covered with maggots. I had four tents to look after in which were fifty-two patients. have seen patients go from the evening of one day until the noon of the next without ice or medical attention. The water used was drawn from a hydrant and was from Chickmauga creek. It was warm."
