## Jeffersonians Spurn the Proposal.

Col. Bryan Disposes of the Belmont Banquet With an Apt Epigram.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., March 23.—William J. Bryan, spent the day in Birmingham and was given an enthusiastic reception. Not only the citizens of Birmingham, but many from neighboring cities and towns came to hear the great leader on the current issues of the day.

"What the Lord's supper is to the Christian, so a Jefferson banquet is to the Democrat. Just as a good Christian would revolt at having the sacrament administered by an infidel, so a good Democrat objects to having a Jefferson banquet presided over by Perry Belmont," was the epigrammatic manner in which Mr. Bryan referred to the much talked of New York banquet next month.—Daily Rocky Mountain News.

The nation's foremost democrat, Hon. W. J. Bryan, will address the Thomas Jefferson banquet in New York city to be given by the Chicago Platform Democratic club of that city April 19th.

The Hay Springs Leader, in last week's issue comes out squarely for ex-governor Holcomb as successor to the late congressman, W. L. Green. What's the matter of a good Democrat for that place?

Senator Teller Says Bryan Did Right. Cleveland, O., March 22.—Senator H. M. Teller of Colorado was asked here to-day what, in his judgement, would be the democratic issue in the next presidential campaign.

"I think there is no doubt," replied Senator Teller, "that the democratic party will make the financial question the issue."

"Who will be the democratic presidential nominee?" "Undoubtedly Mr. Bryan will be the choice of his party," promptly replied the senator.

In regard to W. J. Bryan's controversy with Perry Belmont, Senator Teller said: "I think Mr. Bryan did exactly right in taking the position he did. Those fellows in that organization are not democrats. They are republicans masquerading under democratic colors. They opposed Mr. Bryan's election in 1896, saying his election would endanger the nation's welfare, and he did perfectly right in declining to accept the invitation."
